# Report on Overseas Travel: Rt Hon Jacinda Ardern

I recommend that Cabinet note this report on my travel to Melbourne, Australia from 18 July to 19 July to deliver an address to the Australia New Zealand School of Government (ANZSOG), meet Australian companies investing in New Zealand and New Zealand companies operating in Australia, and meet bilaterally with Prime Minister Scott Morrison as well as the Victorian Governor and Premier.

## Report

- The main purpose of my trip was to deliver a speech to ANZSOG. This had initially been planned for early March, but was deferred. The speech attracted an audience of 2,000, and was entitled "why does good government matter". This followed previous Prime Ministers of Australia and New Zealand giving a similar address.
- Other events were organised around the speech, including meetings with both the Victorian Premier and Governor. Premier Andrews was particularly interested in the methodology behind our Wellbeing Budget. He was also keen to share capabilities and research results in the area of mental health, 9(2)(ba)(i)
- My engagement with a group of Australian investors highlighted some of the strengths of the NZ investment, including: our business culture; the New Zealand mind set of starting a business with a plan to go global rather than just service the domestic market; and New Zealanders' determination to work hard and do more with less. 9(2)(ba)(i)

Several investors noted that NZTE was doing an excellent job of assisting them into the New Zealand market.

The breakfast for around 40 New Zealand business people, with each inviting a key Australian contact, provided an opportunity to get an idea of some of the businesses doing innovative things in the Australian market. I understand from NZTE that many were able to attract very senior Australian contacts on the strength of the format for the breakfast, and the opportunity it provided to

speak to me directly. I understand from NZTE that the event has already resulted in new opportunities for some of the businesses participating. Prime Minister Morrison specifically travelled to Melbourne, allowing for a one on one discussion followed by a full bilateral meeting.  $^{6(a), 6(b)}$  we  $^{6(a), 6(b)}$
