## Report on Overseas Travel: Rt Hon Jacinda Ardern

I recommend that Cabinet note this report on my travel to Apia, Samoa and Tokelau, from 27 July to 1 August 2019. The main purpose of the visit was to deepen New Zealand's relationship with Tokelau, and affirm our enduring commitment and support to the atolls.

### Report

- I stopped in Samoa on 27-28 July and 1 August 2019 en route to and from Tokelau. My aim was to review progress in the bilateral relationship since my inaugural visit in March 2018, as well as discussing Samoan views on constructive engagement with Tokelau. I briefly visited the New Zealand-funded redevelopment of the Apia waterfront event space and clock-tower boulevard, and joined the Samoan Deputy Prime Minister to launch a strategy to help protect Samoa's endangered national bird. That New Zealand's bilateral relationship with Samoa is in good shape, was evidenced by my wide-ranging and positive bilateral meeting with Prime Minister Tuilaepa.
- The key focus of my trip, however, was to visit Tokelau something made possible only with the assistance of the highly professional staff and personnel of the offshore patrol vessel, *HMNZS Otago*. My visit was the first Prime Ministerial visit to New Zealand's only overseas territory in fifteen years; and only the fourth in almost 100 years by a New Zealand Prime Minister, to see the far-flung atolls that house around 1,500 New Zealand citizens. I was accompanied by Minister Faafoi, who had made his own highly successful visit last year, and the Administrator of Tokelau. The participation in my delegation of the Commanding Officer of the Otago, Ben Martin, and Defence Attache, Julie Fritzell, as well as the navy multicultural group, was key to reinforcing the cultural affinity between the people of New Zealand and Tokelau, and referencing the links between us as inhabitants of islands, both of whom navigate the oceans. I was also accompanied, from the first atoll throughout Tokelau and back to Apia, by the Ulu o Tokelau, Kelihiano Kalolo.
- As Tokelau is part of the Realm of New Zealand, New Zealand has constitutional obligations to assist the Government of Tokelau to deliver core public services and provide essential infrastructure, and assist Tokelau to develop its capacity for self-governance. <sup>6(b)(i)</sup>

#### 6(b)(i)

- My visit presented a unique and special opportunity to stress the importance of the New Zealand-Tokelau relationship, and emphasise New Zealand's ongoing commitment to supporting improvements to the quality of life on the atolls; help improve national infrastructure and connectivity; and increase Tokelau's resilience to the impacts of climate change. As a dependent territory, Tokelau is not able to access international climate finance, so New Zealand is the only donor ready to assist with its climate change adaptation and mitigation efforts.
- I visited each of the three inhabited atolls: Atafu, Fakaofo and Nukunonu. Each had undertaken extensive preparations; prepared cultural performances; organised meetings with women's and village councils; and arranged site visits which focused on key issues such as education and health, energy generation, and climate change. Several areas were highlighted where New Zealand's assistance needs to focus, including: improving infrastructure including ICT and air services; improving health services, in particular screening services for women; and rethinking the education model.
- I made several funding announcements, including a project to expand and replace the systems and components of solar energy generating facilities. I opened a new staff and patient residence and toured the hospital on Nukunonu, and gifted foetal heart monitors to the hospitals on each of the atolls. I also opened the new wharf on Fakaofo. Once the last wharf is built, it will mark the end of the largest infrastructure project ever undertaken on Tokelau, to improve the safety of ship to shore transfers on each atoll.
- Tokelau remains one of the few countries in the world without an airstrip (Pitcairn Island is another). I indicated that New Zealand would support the development of one airstrip, provided engineers confirmed that the proposed site was suitable. Effectively, this was a challenge to Tokelau to think nationally rather than locally, and agree on a single best site. <sup>6(a)</sup>
- We took a crew (reporter and camera operator) from TVNZ and Newshub with us. They filed pre-trip reports and a story each day during the trip.
- There were communications challenges for them to file from the atolls but the local telecom company was very helpful (in one case providing space and connectivity for the reporters to work from).
