#### Weekly update on North Island weather event (incl Cyclone Gabrielle) recovery activity

#### Trends in recovery planning

**Hawke's Bay** Regional Council continues its series of sediment and debris funding workshops for commercial entities. This week the Council is holding a workshop in Wairoa.

**Tararua** has had over 50 working bee sessions organised across the district. Fifty farms have been supplied with emergency materials for urgent repairs, volunteers have committed 1,285 hours to the working bees, and over 3.5 kilometres of netting has been supplied for remedial repairs to boundaries and internal fences.

**Enhanced Taskforce Green** has visited six properties in Northland since 19 June and a request for an extension is with the Ministry of Social Development (MSD).

#### **Farmer and Grower Grants**

## \$64.28 million paid in grant applications

As at 12 July, 5,632 applications for farmer and grower recovery grants have been approved and paid, totalling \$64.28 million in value.



Ngāti Kahungunu's annual fish hook summit in Napier on 12 July provided an opportunity for tangata whenua to come together and share their impacts of the cyclone and think about recovery options.

### North Island Weather Event (NIWE) Fund

MPI is still receiving Expressions of Interest (EoIs) to the NIWE Time-Critical and NIWE Isolated Rural Communities Funds.
Initiatives to receive NIWE funding include:

- Rural Support Trust \$1.9 million to co-ordinate local recovery services, clean-up efforts, wellbeing events, extension workshops, and provide other specialised support.
- Post Your Support \$500,000 to support farmers and growers who have had fencing and or growing structures damaged or destroyed by Cyclone Gabrielle.
