Weekly update on North Island weather event (incl. Cyclone Gabrielle) recovery activity

Key Updates

Hawke's Bay:

 The Rapid Relief Team in conjunction with the Rural Support Trust (RST) and other groups held a Farmer Community Connect event in Hastings on Friday 21 July. There were over 300 farmer registrations to attend the event and receive donated fencing materials.

Wairarapa:

- The RST and other sponsors have organised a Blokes' Mystery Bus Trip on Saturday 29 July for an afternoon/evening off the farm (food and drinks provided) and a minibus with planned activities.
- The Rural Education Activities Programme Wairarapa organised pounamu-making workshops at Homewood Road on 20 July, and Old Castle Point School on 21, 22, and 22 July with a hāngi lunch provided.

Tararua:

- The Ladies Lunch in Dannevirke is taking place on 25 July (organised by the RST and targeted at rural women).
- The next Mayors' Taskforce for Recovery Meeting is on 4 August.

East Coast:

 The Forest Industry Contractors' Association has organised a meeting in Rotorua next week with industry to discuss current forestry challenges.

Feed Coordination Service:

The Feed Coordination Service has been extended until October.

Trends in Recovery Planning

The government agreed to an Order in Council on 5 July under the Severe Weather Emergency Recovery Legislation Act 2023 to classify open air burning of cyclone and flood waste as a permitted activity for Tairāwhiti & Hawke's Bay.

Wairarapa:

- A new Programme Manager for recovery in the Wairarapa has been appointed (Simon Taylor).
- Three fencing funds have been pre-approved by Post Your Support. This funding is part of a contract under the NIWE Time-Critical Need fund.

Tararua:

 The Recovery team is looking to launch a campaign to target mental health in the coming weeks.

Animal Welfare:

- Further rain in areas affected by Cyclone Gabrielle is causing difficulties feeding out and poor feed utilisation.

Farmer and Grower Grants



\$64.28 million paid in grant applications

As at 19 July, 5,632 applications for farmer and grower recovery grants have been approved and paid, totalling \$64.28 million in value.

North Island Weather Event (NIWE) Fund

MPI is still receiving Expressions of Interest to the NIWE Time-Critical and NIWE Isolated Rural Communities Funds. Initiatives to receive NIWE funding include:

- Rural Support Trust: \$1.9 million to co-ordinate local recovery services, clean-up efforts, wellbeing events, extension workshops, and provide other specialised support.
- Post Your Support: \$500,000 to support farmers and growers who have had fencing and or growing structures damaged or destroyed by Cyclone Gabrielle.

Woody Debris Fund Update

The delivery of the Woody Debris Fund is progressing well:

- \$3.54 million has been distributed to councils to commence woody debris collection.
- \$2 million has been transferred to Te Puni K\u00f6kiri and grant applications are now open.
- The residual \$4.6 million will be progressed into contracts by mid-August 2023.
- Both Hawke's Bay Regional Council and Gisborne District Council have completed significant work, including:
 - Undertaking detailed spatial analysis and geospatial mapping across the regions to determine woody debris volumes, locations, and key risk areas.
 - Determining the likely priority catchments to protect critical infrastructure, with further engagement (incl. with iwi) now underway.
 - Understanding the costs associated with various types of removal/processing.
 - Engagement of suitably qualified contractors.
 - Development of health and safety plans which is critical prior to debris removal occurring.
 - Gisborne District Council reported that approx. 1.2 million cubic metres of woody debris is sitting within catchments across the region.
