Official Information Act request for documents related to the flooding in Auckland from 27 January 2023 to present day

Thank you for your two Official Information Act 1982 (the Act) requests received on 31 January 2023. You requested from the National Emergency Management Agency (NEMA):

- 1. Please provide copies of documents held by your national executive leadership team that were created since 6am on Friday 27 January relating to this major weather event and its aftermath, such as briefings, aide-memoires, situation updates, talking points, communications plans, correspondence with other agencies, minutes of meetings, key performance indicators, and damage assessments. To assist with your search, I am seeking key documents that provide an insight into the agency's thinking and decision-making immediately before, during and after this city-wide emergency, which will help to scrutinise the performance of its critical public functions during that period.
- 2. Please also provide, if not captured above, briefings provided to ministers relating to this weather event since Friday morning. I am open to discussing refining the request once you've conducted your initial scoping review if it helps to facilitate a timely response. However, given the unprecedented significance of this event, we believe there is an overwhelming public interest in urgent and thorough scrutiny of the department's decision-making which favours a very high level of disclosure.

You requested from the Department of the Prime Minister and Cabinet (DPMC):

Please provide copies of documents held by DPMC's executive leadership team that were created since 6am on Friday 27 January relating to this major weather event and its aftermath, such as briefings, aide-memoires, situation updates, talking points, communications plans, correspondence with other agencies, minutes of meetings, key performance indicators, and damage assessments. To assist with your search, I am seeking key documents that provide an insight into the department's thinking and decision-making immediately before, during and after this city-wide emergency, which will help to scrutinise the performance of its critical public functions during that period. I am open to discussing refining the request if it helps to facilitate a timely response. However, given the unprecedented significance of this event, we believe there is an overwhelming public interest in urgent and thorough scrutiny of the department's decision-making which favours a very high level of disclosure.

Thank you for your email of the same date advising your confirmation of our approach and follow up request for:

I didn't emphasise this in my request, but we are especially keen for the communications (emails, texts, conference calls, etc) of the senior players in those crucial hours on Friday evening and Friday night, to be included in the scope.

We also received a request from you that was transferred to us from the Ministry of Business, Innovation and Employment (MBIE) on 20 March 2023. We informed you on 27 March 2023 that this transfer would be combined into this response. For clarity, the part of your request to MBIE that was transferred to NEMA and DPMC, relates to the NEMA National Coordination Centre action plans and situation reports.

The time frame for responding to your request was extended under section 15A of the Act by 40 working days because it necessitated consultations to be undertaken before a decision could be made on the request. Following this extension, I am now able to respond.

NEMA is a departmental agency located within DPMC. As set out in our in our email dated 1 February 2023, we advised that as both requests were submitted on the same day asking for common information, we have combined the requests and provided one response.

We have interpreted DPMC executive leadership team to include the Secretary of DPMC and members of the Executive Leadership team. We have interpreted NEMA's national executive leadership team to include the Chief Executive, Deputy Chief Executive Emergency Management, Deputy Chief Executive Strategic Enablement, Chief of Staff, Chief Advisor to the Chief Executive and the Chief Advisor to the DCE Emergency Management.

Regarding the part of your request for correspondence, we have interpreted this to include emails and communication apps such as Signal, which relate to the Auckland floods in January 2023 within the specified time period.

Your request specified that you are 'seeking key documents that provide an insight into the agency's thinking and decision-making'. We have taken this to exclude administrative information such as correspondence relating to the arranging of meetings and allocating responsibility for drafting or managing work to a particular staff member.

I have decided to release the relevant parts of the documents listed above, subject to information being withheld under the following sections of the Act, as applicable:

- 1. section 6(a), to protect the security or defence of New Zealand or the international relations of the Government of New Zealand
- 2. section 9(2)(a), to protect the privacy of individuals
- 3. section 9(2)(g)(i), to maintain the effective conduct of public affairs through the free and frank expression of opinion
- 4. section 9(2)(g)(ii), to prevent improper pressure or harassment
- 5. section 9(2)(h), to maintain legal professional privilege
- 6. section 9(2)(k), to prevent disclosure or use for improper gain or advantage

Signal messages and the Officials' Committee for Domestic and External Security Coordination (ODESC) Watch Group Agenda and Minutes are in scope of your request, and we have decided to release these to you. However, we require more time to prepare the information for release, as we need to consult further with the Prime Minister's Office, the Minster for Emergency Management's Office and other government agencies. We are considering withholding some information under section 6 and 9 of the Act. This information will be provided to you as soon as possible.

Accordingly, I have refused your request for the documents listed in the above table under section 18(d) of the Act – the information requested will soon be publicly available.

Information to be withheld

There is additional information covered by your request that I have decided to withhold in full under the following sections of the Act:

- 1. section 9(2)(a), to protect the privacy of individuals
- 2. section 9(2)(b)(ii), to protect the commercial position of the person who supplied the information, or who is the subject of the information
- 3. section 9(2)(ba)(i), to protect the supply of similar information in the future
- 4. section 9(2)(g)(i), to maintain the effective conduct of public affairs through the free and frank expression of opinion
- 5. section 9(2)(g)(ii), to prevent improper pressure or harassment
- 6. section 9(2)(h), to maintain legal professional privilege

Email correspondence titled 'RE Need timeline for declaration conversations asap for PMO II' dated Tuesday, 31 January 2023, contains a large amount of information that I have decided to withhold under section 9(2)(g)(i) of the Act. Some administrative information in this document can be released but the substantial redactions would make this information meaningless to release so I have decided to withhold this document in full under sections 9(2)(a), 9(2)(g)(i) and 9(2)(g)(ii) of the Act.

Identified as relevant to your request are also some briefings provided by the DPMC Policy Advisory Group to the Prime Minister. These briefings are provided to the Prime Minister in confidence to support them in their role as leader of the Government and chair of Cabinet. These briefings are withheld in their entirety under the following sections of the Act:

- section 9(2)(f)(ii) as withholding the information is necessary to maintain the constitutional conventions for the time being which protect collective and individual ministerial responsibility;
- section 9(2)(f)(iv) as withholding the information is necessary to maintain the constitutional conventions for the time being which protect the confidentiality of advice tendered by Ministers of the Crown and officials; and
- section 9(2)(g)(i) as withholding the information is necessary to maintain the
 effective conduct of public affairs through the free and frank expression of opinions
 by or between or to Ministers of the Crown or members of an organisation or
 officers and employees of any department or organisation in the course of their
 duty.

For your information, I have provided the Emergency Management roles and responsibilities as Appendix A, which might be of interest.

In making my decision, I have taken the public interest considerations in section 9(1) of the Act into account.

You have the right to ask the Ombudsman to investigate and review my decision under section 28(3) of the Act.

This response may be published on the Department of the Prime Minister and Cabinet's website during our regular publication cycle. Typically, information is released monthly, or as otherwise determined. Your personal information including name and contact details will be removed for publication.

Appendix A – Emergency Management roles and responsibilities

The Civil Defence Emergency Management Act 2002 (the Act) creates the framework for New Zealand to prepare for, deal with and recover from local and national emergencies. It reflects the approach that responses to emergencies are locally led, regionally coordinated, and nationally supported.

The Act defines the roles and responsibilities of government departments, local government agencies, emergency services and lifeline utilities in the planning and preparing for emergencies and for response and recovery in the event of an emergency.

At the national level the Act provides for the appointments of a Director of Civil Defence Emergency Management (Director), National Controller and National Transition Manager. An important role of the Director is to inform the Prime Minister and Minister for Emergency Management of impending emergencies or rapid on-set emergencies as soon as is possible and, during an emergency, keep them informed of the response.

During significant emergencies, the Minister for Emergency Management (Minister) will often be the Government's principal spokesperson and will generally lead engagement with Cabinet on policy decisions regarding the response to, and recovery from, emergency events. This includes briefing Cabinet on the consequences of the emergency, which may include recommending financial assistance or additional support from a range of Ministerial portfolios. Under the Act, the Minister can declare states of national emergency. The Minister can also declare states of local emergency in certain cases, but the primary responsibility for such declarations lies with mayors or those appointed by Civil Defence Emergency Management (CDEM) groups to make such declarations.

The National Emergency Management Agency (NEMA) is the Central Government lead for emergency management. NEMA provides strategic leadership for risk reduction, readiness, response, and recovery activities, and builds emergency management capability and capacity. NEMA also leads or supports the response to, and recovery from, emergencies while also supporting the operation of the emergency management system.

During an emergency, NEMA supports the Minister's Office with advice, information, and other services such as the preparation of media material.

NEMA maintains a Monitoring, Alerting and Reporting (MAR) Centre to monitor, assess and report on potential emergencies. When there is an emergency, MAR provides situational awareness so NEMA or other agencies can respond – and, where necessary, alert the public about threats to life or property.

CDEM Groups are based on regional council boundaries and formed from constituent city and district councils. The Groups are responsible for the implementation of providing coordinated CDEM planning for reduction, readiness, response, and recovery from emergencies at the local and regional level. It's important to note that CDEM Groups don't report to NEMA.

Specific to January 2023 Auckland Floods

The Auckland CDEM Group, Auckland Emergency Management (AEM), has an office based in Auckland Council and works in partnership with emergency services and other organisations to ensure effective coordination of civil defence and emergency management within the Auckland area. During the recent Auckland flooding event, AEM led the response with support from NEMA and other local and national agencies.

States of Emergency

The Act provides for states of local and national emergency to be declared, provides for certain people to be authorised to declare a state of local emergency, and provides powers to the CDEM Group and controllers when a state of emergency is in force. Emergency powers under the Act include the ability to give directions, evacuate premises/places, enter onto premises (e.g., to rescue people or save lives), and close roads and public spaces.

The CDEM Group must appoint at least one person (a representative of the Group) to declare a state of local emergency for the Group's area. Mayors can declare a state of local emergency for their territorial district and the Minister can declare a state of national emergency for New Zealand. The Minister can also declare a state of local emergency in exceptional circumstances when the local authorities are not able to do so.

During an emergency response, the CDEM Group's Controller is the decision maker in directing actions to respond to the emergency and overseeing the provision of information and public safety statements. The Controller's emergency powers cannot be exercised while there is no declared state of emergency in place.

Because a state of emergency provides the Director and Controllers access to powers not normally available, consideration should be given to whether emergency powers are required or likely to be required. This includes considering things like the need to evacuate people from their homes, safety of people and property.

Where possible, those with the power to declare states of local emergency should discuss the likelihood of a declaration with the Group Controller prior to declaring. If possible, they should also discuss this with their NEMA Regional Emergency Management Advisor to ensure that any necessary national level support needed is provided.

A person who is authorised can declare a state of local emergency when an emergency has occurred or may occur within the area. There are three limbs to the definition of "emergency" in the Act:

emergency means a situation that—

- (a) is the result of any happening, whether natural or otherwise, including, without limitation, any explosion, earthquake, eruption, tsunami, land movement, flood, storm, tornado, cyclone, serious fire, leakage or spillage of any dangerous gas or substance, technological failure, infestation, plague, epidemic, failure of or disruption to an emergency service or a lifeline utility, or actual or imminent attack or warlike act; and
- (b) causes or may cause loss of life or injury or illness or distress or in any way endangers the safety of the public or property in New Zealand or any part of New Zealand; and
- (c) cannot be dealt with by emergency services, or otherwise requires a significant and coordinated response under this Act

A state of emergency lasts for seven days but can be extended by an authorised person.

While, declaring a state of emergency enables CDEM personnel access to additional powers, a declaration of a state of local emergency is not required to get assistance from central government. Local officials regularly seek and receive assistance from central government to support their emergency response.

Following a state of emergency, the Act provides for the notice of transition periods to be given. The purpose of a transition period is to aid recovery by providing powers to appointed Recovery Manager(s) to manage, coordinate, or direct recovery activities.

A Mayor can give notice of a local transition period for the territorial district. If the Mayor is absent, an elected member of a territorial authority may give notice of a local transition period. The Minister can give notice of a national transition period for the whole of New Zealand or any areas or districts where it appears to the Minister that a national transition period is required. The Controller, Recovery Manager and NEMA Regional Emergency Management Advisor should be consulted where possible when an authorised person is wanting to give notice of a transition period.

Local transition periods last for 28 days, and National transition periods last for 90 days. Both Local and National transition periods can be extended or terminated early by an authorised person.


Severe Weather - Aotearoa

This heavy rain is likely to disturb travel plans as people travel to and from areas affected by heavy rainfall for the long weekend.

Heavy rain may cause streams and rivers to rise rapidly. Surface flooding and slips are also possible and driving conditions may be hazardous.

Severe Weather Update

- Orange heavy rain warnings are in force for Northland, Auckland, Coromandel peninsula, Bay of Plenty west of Whakatane and Mount Taranaki.
- There is currently a severe thunderstorm warning for Kaipara, Auckland City, Waitakere, Whangarei, Rodney, Gulf, Albany. These thunderstorms are expected to be accompanied by torrential rain.
- SH1 Brynderwyn to Whangarei is closed due to a slip.
- SH1 in the Dome Valley is closed due to a slip.
- SH25 in the Coromandel, between Kopu and Hikuai, has been closed.

Auckland Update




What the government is doing

- The National Emergency Management Agency has stood up its National Coordination Centre in the Beehive to support the esponse in Auckland and coordinate any central government support that may be required.
- NEMA has Regional Emergency Management Advisors (REMAs) in Auckland, available to assist further as required.
- While it is still too early to know the extent of the damage, the government is ready to provide further support to those affected if necessary.

Public safety messages

- If life, health or property is in danger, call 111 immediately.
- Put safety first. Don't take any chances. Act quickly if you see rising water.
- Do not try to walk, play, swim, or drive in floodwater: even water just 15 centimetres deep can sweep you off your feet, and half a metre of water will carry away most vehicles. Flood water is often contaminated and can make you sick.
- Help others if it is safe to do so, especially people who may require special assistance.
- When you evacuate bring with you any essential items you may need including medication, warm clothing and baby items.
- Take your pets with you when you evacuate if it's not safe for you, it's not safe for them.

If you have been evacuated, it may not be safe to return home even when the floodwaters have receded. Listen to emergency services and local Civil Defence authorities and don't return home until they tell you it is safe to do so.



Today's weather is best described as "isolated showers, some heavy", in contrast to the widespread and heavy rainfall yesterday.

These falls are mostly confined to the western parts of Auckland with a risk of further localised/brief surface flooding this afternoon and evening (from about 1pm-9pm)

A persistent rainband returns on Sunday with the highest risk for heavy falls in eastern areas of Auckland (esp Hunua Ranges) accompanied by the chance of further thunderstorms during the afternoon and early evening.

Another sub-tropical system is expected from Tuesday to Thursday bringing further risk of heavy rain and strong north easterlies. This could also affect Northland and the Coromandel.

The weather is expected to begin to 'settle' on Friday.



- 10 International flights have been diverted as at 0930hrs 28 January, with all Air New Zealand services being sent to Christchurch.
- The aircraft are all widebody aircraft, with capacity of 230 ish PAX per plane; we believe about 2,000 people in total. Many are still airside at Christchurch airport.
- AirNZ is providing numbers of displaced passengers that may require emergency accommodation.
- In addition we understand there are 500-1,000 people in the airport precinct awaiting flights.
- The NCC is in liaison with Canterbury CDEM Group as to what welfare support, if any, is required to support passengers in Christchurch.

Kia ora PM/Minister,

An update below (with emphasis on new information).

Auckland Update

- As at 1500hrs Police have confirmed three fatalities. The third fatality is related to a landslide that impacted a propriety in Remuera. Separately one other person is missing in the Onewhero area and a search and rescue operation is underway.
- Auckland Emergency Management (AEM) have received approximately 60 requests for accommodation. These have not all been met at this stage due to major events and the closure of the airport.
- Auckland International Airport will be open tomorrow morning with the first departure at 5am.
- Airlines are notifying impacted international passengers, that due to the declaration of emergency, passenger accommodation is not being provided under their contractual obligations. Up to 1,000 people are in the airport vicinity awaiting flights. The airport is communicating with Auckland CDEM regarding support.

The NCC is assisting by helping to arrange the deployment of 350 beds from Red Cross Kapiti for use at Auckland airport.

- 10 international flights with approx. 2,000 passengers have diverted to Christchurch. There are also 500-1,000 people in the airport vicinity awaiting flights. The CDEM Group is engaged in support of the welfare response.
- The wastewater network and treatment plants in Auckland have been overwhelmed by stormwater, causing numerous overflows across Auckland. Two wastewater pump stations (Wairau Road and Albany) were damaged resulting in overflow. Crews are onsite and repairs are expected to resolve these issues today.
- The Elton John concert tonight and Laneway Festival on Monday have been cancelled.

Severe Weather Update

- Significant rain is expected on Sunday for Coromandel, Auckland and Northland by evening (totals may approach warning amounts, 80-100mm in 24 hours) and cause significant issues on already saturated ground.
- Another impactful sub-tropical system is expected from Tuesday to Thursday, bringing additional risk of heavy rain and thunderstorms. Regions from Northland, Auckland, Coromandel and into the western Bay of Plenty are likely to experience the highest impact Taupō, Waikato and Taranaki may also be affected to a lesser extent.

This is Sarah Holland, Chief Advisor NEMA, standing in for the Director.

Waikato

Waitomo District, Waikato is about to declare a state of local emergency for the district due to flooding in Te Kuiti (Managaokewa stream). 12 houses are inundated and shops are at risk of flooding. The powers needed relate to the ability to require an evacuation and to exclude vehicles (as these are driving through flood waters). The situation is being managed by Regional and Local coordination centres. No additional support is required at this time (1915hrs).

Auckland Update

- Health There has been no significant impact to clinical services all hospitals, including emergency
 departments remain open. There is damage to some parts of Waitakere, North Shore, Mason Clinic and
 Auckland Hospital campuses (including Auckland City Hospital, Starship Children's Health and Greenlane
 Clinical Centre ranging from flooding to possible structural damage and electrical issues).
- As at 1500hrs, Vector report approximately 3,800 customers remained without power. Of these 3,100 are in areas that are difficult to access. Vector is working with Civil Defence and NZTA to gain access for repair work however, these areas are likely to be without power for some considerable time.
- As at 12,30pm today approximately 30 local roads are closed. Fallen trees and slips have blocked roads, and a bridge has been swept away.
- The number of people requiring accommodation is likely to increase, and the provision of accommodation is likely to remain the largest resource requirement.

Bay Of Plenty

- Heavy rain is expected to continue overnight in Bay of Plenty, and the Bay of Plenty CDEM Group Duty
 Team is monitoring the situation and is liaising with Local Controllers and the Flood Management Team.
 At this time, there are no impacts requiring a coordinated CDEM response. If this changes CDEM staff are
 prepared to respond.
- The Bay of Plenty Regional Council have advised that the Whakatane River has reached first warning level. Farmers adjacent to the river have been advised to move stock to higher ground.

Latest update

Severe Weather Update

- Orange heavy rain warnings are in place for Coromandel Peninsula, and Bay of Plenty.
- There are heavy rain watches in place for Auckland, Taupo, and Hawke's Bay.

Northland

- SH1 Pūhoi, is closed between Woodcocks Road in Warkworth and Grand Drive in Orewa. This road should open by midday tomorrow (Sunday 29).
- SH1 remains closed from SH12 intersection to Waipu due to slips and geotechnical engineers are assessing when the road can re-open.

Auckland

- The Hobsonville/ Beachhaven ferry to closed until further notice due to significant landslips around the Hobsonville wharf.
- At 2010hrs tonight (Saturday 28) there are 46 road closures including local, arterial and State Highways.

Waikato

- Waikato has declared a state of local emergency for the Waitomo district at 1905hrs Saturday 28 January. The state of local emergency has been declared due to flooding in Te Kuiti.
- Waitomo District Council Emergency Management has activated, and the Waikato CDEM Group is in monitoring mode.
- SH3 and SH37 are closed in places due to flooding and slips. Multiple local roads are also closed due to slips and flooding.

SH 25A Kopu to Hikuai is closed until further notice due to a large slip.

Gisborne

SH2 Marawau is closed east of the intersection with Motu Road due to flooding.

National Support

- A fact sheet setting out "what support is available and where people can get help" has been
 published. Whilst it largely covers government agencies and Auckland Council, it includes advice
 on insurance claims including a number for uninsured homeowners.
- The Government has provided an initial \$100,000 to the Mayoral relief fund to help communities in Auckland dealing with the impacts of the flood event.

- 2. Massey University Albany Campus, Sir Neil Waters Theatre, Gate 1/Main Entrance (off Albany Expressway), Albany
- 3. Manu Tukutuku, 32 Riverton Drive, Randwick Park

Water supply and wastewater network

Watercare's water treatment plants are operating and your water is safe to drink.

Residents living in Titirangi, Woodlands Park, Oratia, Greenbay, Waima and elevated sections of Scenic Drive are likely to have no water or low water pressure for at least the next 48 hours.

A 30-metre-long section of water pipe that ran along Scenic Drive in Titirangi was washed away with the road due to a landslide. It will be challenging to repair due to the extent of the damage and access to the site.

Watercare is sending out water tankers to the area. Customers will be able to fill up their water bottles from the tankers.

Residents on the North Shore are asked to reduce their water use. Please keep your showers short and do not use your washing machines. This is to reduce the volume of wastewater leaving your properties.

A wastewater pump station on Wairau Road that serves several suburbs on the North Shore has been flooded. This means the pump station is overflowing into a nearby waterway.

The wastewater networks and treatment plants have been overwhelmed by stormwater, causing numerous overflows across Auckland.

Watercare is prioritising overflows that are damaging private property. Most of the clean up activity will need to occur when the rain stops, as this is when the overflows will stop flowing.

Cleaning up after a flood

It is important to clean and dry your house and everything in it. Floodwater may contain sewage and other hazardous materials which can contaminate your home.

- If your gas meter has been affected by water or debris, contact your gas supplier.
- Always work safely when cleaning up after a flood by wearing protective clothing and washing hands thoroughly after clean-up and before handling food.
- Keep children and animals away from previously flooded areas until they have been cleaned and made safe.
- Take photos and videos of the damage and anything that needs to be thrown away before starting the clean-up, for insurance purposes.
- Clean up, drain, and dry inside as quickly as possible. Take out everything that is wet and that can be moved floor coverings, furniture, bedding, clothing, etc., and put them outside to dry when the weather is fine.
- Throw away all food and drinking water that has come in contact with floodwater, including things stored in containers.
- Do not eat garden produce if the soil has been flooded. Clean up and remove debris and sprinkle gardens with lime.

Where to turn for help and support

Civil Defence Payments

Civil Defence Payments are available for people who have been affected by the floodings in the Auckland region.

You don't have to be on a benefit to qualify for a Civil Defence Payment. In most cases it doesn't matter what your income is or what assets you have. These payments are available for a limited time.

A Civil Defence Payment can help with:

- accommodation costs if you're evacuated and are staying in accommodation such as motels, hotels or temporary rental accommodation,
- loss of income because you can't work due to the flooding,
- emergency food, clothing and bedding if yours has been damaged or destroyed by the flooding,
- a payment if you have evacuees staying with you in places such as a private home, marae or community centres.

Call Work and Income on 0800 400 100 between 8am and 5pm on the Saturday 28th, Sunday 29th and Monday 30th of January 2023 to apply for Civil Defence payments.

Insurance and lodging a claim

If your home, car, or contents have been damaged by the severe weather, take photos before you remove or repair anything and report it to your insurance company as soon as possible. You only need to contact your insurance company and they'll let you know what you need to do next, how to claim and – if applicable – how EQ Cover from Toka Tū Ake EQC works.

If you need to make your home safe, sanitary, secure, and weather tight, please record the work done, take before and after photos, and keep copies of the bills you paid.

If you are an uninsured homeowner, contact the EOC Welfare team on 03 543 7290 (After hours 03 546 0200).

If you don't have house insurance but do have contents insurance, speak to your insurer about what is covered. Make sure you take lots of photos and keep good records before you throw anything out, where possible.

The <u>Residential Advisory Service</u> (RAS) within MBIE provide advocacy services and advice to homeowners who are navigating insurance claims to remediate damage suffered due to an event. You can contact <u>info@advisory.org.nz</u> or ring 0800 777 299, 03 379 7027 for more information.

Tenancy information

Schools and early childhood education centres

The Ministry of Education supports all schools and early learning services to help them recover from the event. Parents and caregivers should check with their school or early learning service for updated information.

Local healthcare Services

Health care services across Auckland are continuing to provide care if you need it

All hospitals, including emergency departments remain open. If you are seriously unwell and need emergency care please dial 111.

For less critical non-emergency care, people can continue to phone their GP in the first instance. Phones will be managed 24 hours, either directly or through an after hours duty GP. Most GPs who would normally be open at the weekend have been able to open usual.

For urgent, less serious, health concerns when your doctor is unavailable, contact your local accident and medical centre. A list of these is available on <u>Healthount</u>. All clinics are open as usual.

Community pharmacies can support you if you don't have your regular prescription medications. A list of open pharmacies can be found on Healthpoint.



Background

- On Friday, 27 January 2023, MetService issued a Red Heavy Rain warning for the Auckland region, along with other severe weather warnings and watches for northern and central parts of the North Island. Multiple Orange heavy rain warnings are in place for Northland, Coromandel Peninsula, Bay of Plenty west of Whakatane, Mount Taranaki and Wairarapa.
- The heavy rainfall across the Auckland region has resulted in widespread surface flooding, displacement of people, infrastructure damage, road closures, landslips and ongoing welfare needs. The full extent of impacts is still under assessment.
- 3. A Local State of Emergency was declared in Auckland on Friday 27 January 2023 at 2127hrs by Auckland Emergency Management and is in effect for seven days (unless lifted earlier or extended). The National Crisis Centre was activated on Friday 27 January 2023 at 2327hrs to support Auckland Emergency Management.
- 4. The Ministry of Social Development has stood up three Civil Defence Centres across Auckland to offer support where required. NEMA has deployed Regional Emergency Management Advisors to assist the Auckland Emergency Coordination Centre. Several other agencies are also providing ongoing support, including the Ministry of Transport, Waka Kotahi, and the New Zealand Defence Force.

Government support through contributions to relief funds

- 5. Government policy on financial support to local authorities in emergencies is set out in the Guide to the National Civil Defence Emergency Management Plan 2015 (the Guide).
- 6. Under the Guide, you (as Minister for Emergency Management) can authorise a lump sum contribution to a mayoral relief fund (or funds) totalling up to \$100,000 (excl. GST) with the agreement of either the Prime Minister or the Minister of Finance. Contributions above \$100,000 require approval by Cabinet.

There is currently \$661,000 (excl. GST) available for relief fund contributions

7. At 28 January 2023, there is \$661,000 (excl. GST) available in the expense category providing for Government contributions to mayoral relief funds in 2022/23.1

¹ This amount is a one-off carry-over from the 2021/22 Financial Year and is time-limited to the end of the 2022/23 Financial Year, or until it is spent (whichever comes first). From 2023/24, the expense category will reset to a budget of \$500,000 per year.

If Ministers authorise a contribution of \$100,000 (excl. GST) to Auckland Council for this
event, there will be \$561,000 (excl. GST) remaining in the expense category until the end of
the 2022/23 Financial Year.

Operation of Mayoral Relief Funds

Mayoral Relief Funds are administered by local authorities

- 9. The Guide sets out the Government's expectations for the use of financial contributions to Mayoral Relief Funds. These funds are intended to support and meet the needs of affected individuals and families, community organisations and marae, and their associated facilities and infrastructure. These contributions supplement, but do not replace, other central government assistance that may be available.
- 10. You are not responsible for decisions on individual grants made from a relief fund. The Government's contribution to a relief fund is in the form of a donation, which is then disbursed by the administrator of the fund (Gisborne District Council in this case).
- 11. Local authorities have significant discretion around how they set up and administer their fund, and the criteria they use to disburse payments. In the past, councils have required that relief funds can only be used for financial hardship in situations where the applicant has first exhausted general sources of finance, such as support from family and Work and Income.

- 12. If you agree to contribute \$100,000 to an Auckland Council Mayoral Relief Fund, sign the letter attached as **Annex One** and send it to the Prime Minister for his agreement.
- 13. The Director of Civil Defence Emergency Management will write to Mayor Brown to let him know that the contribution has been agreed and outline the expectations for its use. The Council will also be required to provide NEMA with a high-level report on its expenditure within six months of receiving the contribution, and to return any unspent monies to the Crown.

Re: Contribution to an Auckland Council Mayoral Relief Fund

I am writing to seek your agreement to make a financial contribution to an Auckland Council mayoral relief fund following the recent severe weather event.

On 27 January, heavy rainfall in Auckland resulted in severe flooding across the region along with multiple landslips, road closures, displaced people and ongoing welfare needs. A local state of emergency was declared.

Under the *Guide to the National Civil Defence Emergency Management Plan 2015*, the Minister for Emergency Management may authorise a contribution to a mayoral or disaster relief fund totalling up to \$100,000 (excl. GST) with the agreement of either the Prime Minister or the Minister of Finance.

Given the scale of the event, I consider that it would be appropriate for the Government to offer an initial contribution of \$100,000 to an Auckland Council Mayoral Relief Fund.

The contribution would come from the Non-Departmental Other Expenses category of the *Emergency Management Leadership and Support* multi-category appropriation in Vote Prime Minister and Cabinet. I am advised that there is sufficient funding in the appropriation to make this contribution.

If you agree to authorise the contribution, please sign the following recommendations and return this letter to my office. I have attached a copy of a National Emergency Management Agency briefing regarding this contribution for your information.

Background

1. The Auckland Council is a unitary authority. The CDEM Group office, Auckland Emergency Management (AEM) operates as unit within Auckland City Council. AEM has approximately 35 staff.

Current Situation:

Severe Weather Update

- 2. A red heavy rain warning was in force for Auckland overnight and expired at 0300hrs Saturday.
- 3. Orange heavy rain warnings are in force for Coromandel Peninsula, Waikato, Bay of Plenty, Mount Taranaki, and Wairarapa.
- 4. The active front for Auckland should clear today, but Auckland will continue to have sporadic heavy rain until early next week.

Auckland Update

- 5. Auckland Civil Defence Emergency Management (AEM) has declared a state of local emergency at 2127hrs Friday 27 January. It is in force for seven days.
- 6. Auckland Emergency Management Emergency Coordination Centre (ECC) has been stood up from 0800hrs.
- 7. NEMA has deployed two Regional Emergency Management Advisors (REMAs) to the Auckland ECC.
- 8. NEMA has activated the National Coordination Centre.
- 9. There has been one death in Auckland's North Shore which is still unconfirmed to be related to the severe weather event.
- 10. There are road closures across Auckland, including multiple closures on SH1. AEM is engaged and providing support to communities that were isolated.
- 11. Civil Defence Centre's (CDC) have stood up on the Northshore at the Massey University Albany Campus, in South Auckland at Manu Tukutuku, and in Kelston at St Leonard's Road School. NZDF is sending 18 personnel to support CDCs.
- 12. At 0140hrs Saturday (28 January) approximately 60 people required accommodation at the Kelston CDC.
- 13. The public are setting up spontaneous evacuation centres across the region and as AEM is being made aware of them, they are doing their best to provide support.
- 14. FENZ (USAR) are planning for rapid damage assessments and the Auckland Council Building Control Teams are preparing for rapid building assessments today (28 January).
- 15. Accommodation providers across Auckland are heavily booked this weekend, making it difficult to find accommodation for those that need it. This is due to the Elton John concert, numerous other large events and it being a holiday weekend. Work is ongoing to source accommodation options for those that need it most and people are being encouraged to seek assistance from friends and family where at all possible.

- 16. Multiple supermarkets have been impacted by flooding.






Location of Bledisloe House, 24 Wellesley Street West, Auckland CBD




Location of Kelston CDC, St Leonard's Road School, 15 St. Leonard's Road




Location of South Auckland CDC, Manu Tukutuku, 32 Riverton Drive, Randwick Park



Auckland

- Auckland International Airport plans to resume international flights this morning.
- No other major developments in Auckland overnight.

Waikato

- An emergency operating centre (EOC) has been activated in the Waitomo District overnight
- Te Kūiti Pa opened their doors overnight and received people who needed to evacuate their homes.
- Conserve water notice in place for Piopio due a watermain bursting. A notice is in place in Te Kūiti due to high river level and dirtiness of water, the Water Treatment Plant (WTP) is struggling to meet demand.
- An estimated 100 houses are affected in Te Kūiti due to a leak on Mangarino Road. Water engineers are working on fixing the leak, a water truck will be present at 0800hrs to supply water. There is no estimated time for the repair to be completed.

Bay of Plenty

A house has been damaged by a landslide on Egret Avenue in Maungatapu, Tauranga and the residents evacuated. Building inspectors will be onsite this morning to evaluate the damage.

Other residents on Egret Avenue were also evacuated overnight due to their houses flooding.

NEMA Actions

- The National Coordination Centre (NCC) is operating again today with a full staff complement. Priorities will be to support both Auckland and Waitomo.
- A national teleconference with impacted CDEM Groups, Metservice and relevant national agencies will be held at 0930 hrs.


North Island Severe Weather

Severe Weather Update

An orange heavy rain warning is in force for Coromandel Peninsula, and Bay of Plenty. Heavy rain watches are in place for Auckland, Jaupo, and the Hawke's Bay.

A second sub-tropical flow is expected to move across the upper North Island from Tuesday through to Thursday this week. The flow is expected to bring heavy rain which will reach warning criteria to parts of the North Island including Northland, Auckland, Coromandel Peninsula, and Bay of Plenty.

The flow is expected to affect parts of the South Island from Wednesday including Tasman, Westland, and Fiordland.



Northland

Geotechnical engineers are assessing when SH1 from Brynderwyn to Waipu can be reopened. SH1 remains closed in multiple locations due to multiple large slips

Auckland

Rain eased in Auckland yesterday, however severe flooding is still present, and more rain is forecast for today. The state of local emergency declared at 2127hrs Friday 27 January remains in place. The Auckland Emergency Coordination Centre (ECC) remains active. There is seven EMAT personnel, and five NEMA deployed personnel at the ECC providing support.

There are three Civil Defence Centre's (CDC) operational with support from New Zealand Defence Force (NZDF). Approximately 60 people utilised these centres on Friday night. There have been three confirmed deaths in Auckland related to the severe weather event, and another person is missing.

A number of state highways, arterial and local roads are closed due to flooding and large slips. A bridge collapse in Riverhead has caused 50 to 100 people to become isolated. The Hobsonville/ Beachhaven ferry has closed until further notice due to significant landslips around the Hobsonville wharf.

The Auckland International Airport terminal has reopened this morning, allowing flights to and from Auckland. An Auckland Airport spokesperson advised travellers to check flight schedules as they may be delayed for several days.

There is a water outage affecting residents in Titirangi, Woodlands Park, Oratia and Green Bay due to a damaged pipe in the area. This should be rectified by Sunday evening.

There have been no significant impacts from the weather to clinical health services and all hospitals, including emergency departments remain open. There is damage to some parts of Waitakere, North Shore, Mason Clinic and Auckland Hospital campuses (including Auckland City Hospital, Starship Children's Health and Greenlane Clinical Centre). The damage ranges from flooding to possible structural damage and electrical issues). Many hospitals are at capacity for patients, some evacuees are arriving with health needs at Civil Defence Centres but are being treated as they arrive.

Waikato

Waikato declared a state of local emergency for the Waitomo District at 1905hrs on Saturday 28 January. An EOC has been activated in the Waitomo District and Te Kūiti Pā have received people who needed to evacuate their homes overnight. Multiple roads are impacted across the region due to slips and flooding.

A conserve water notice is in place for Piopio due a watermain bursting. A notice is in place in Te Kūiti due to high river level and contamination of water, the Water Treatment Plant (WTP) is struggling to meet demand. An estimated 100 houses are affected in Te Kūiti due to a leak on Mangarino Road. A water truck will be present at 0800hrs this morning to provide water to affected residents. Water engineers are working on fixing the leak, however there is no estimated time for completion.

Bay of Plenty

An orange heavy rain warning is in force until 1100hrs today. Rivers across the region are being monitored and farmers adjacent to the Whakatāne River have been advised to move stock to higher ground. A house has collapsed after a landslide in Maungatapu, Tauranga. The house was evacuated along with neighbouring residents whose homes were flooded.

- The National Emergency Management Agency has stood up its National Coordination Centre in the Beehive to support the response in Auckland and coordinate any central government support that may be required.
- Check <u>www.metservice.com</u> for the latest on weather for your region, your local council or Civil Defence Emergency Management (CDEM) Group website for instructions and advice, and <u>www.nzta.govt.nz</u> for highway information.
- A number of roads are closed due to flooding. People should avoid non-essential travel today. Stay home if you can. If you do have to travel, drive to the conditions and never drive through floodwaters. Do not drive or walk through flood waters, and do not let yours kids play in it.
- AEM have opened Civil Defence Centres for those who need to evacuate and cannot stay with friends or whānau. The list of these is available on the AEM Facebook page and their website aucklandemergencymanagement.org.nz.
- A fact sheet setting out "what support is available and where people can get help" has been published. Whilst
 it largely covers government agencies and Auckland Council, it includes advice on insurance claims including
 a number for uninsured homeowners.

Below is an update accurate as at 0930hrs Sunday 29 January. The next scheduled update will be noon, but I will update you earlier if there are significant developments.

Auckland

- Auckland International Airport plan to resume international flights this morning.
- Spark has opened Wi-Fi hotspots to assist communications for displaced residents.
- Vector has restored power to 23,000 homes with approximately 3,500 remaining without power.
- . Counties Power have 29 rural properties without power, expected reinstalment within 24hours.
- Countdown supermarkets report that they are unable to deliver goods to their Northland stores because of road closures. They also advised they have had to close one site due to flooding.
- Foodstuffs have reported 3 supermarket closures because of the flooding across the region.
- Aucklanders are being asked to only buy what they need due to logistical delays across the region.
- Auckland Council plan on using drones to inspect three hard to access watercourses and known landslips in west Auckland and the North Shore.
- The NEMA Director will travel to Auckland today to provide support to AEM and the nine NEMA staff already there.

Waikato

- Conserve water notice in place for Piopio due a watermain bursting. A notice is in place in Te Kūiti due to high river level and dirtiness of water, the Water Treatment Plant (WTP) is struggling to meet demand.
- An estimated 100 houses are affected in Te Kūiti due to a leak on Mangarino Road. Water engineers are
 working on fixing the leak, a water truck will be present at 0800hrs to supply water. There is no estimated
 time for the repair to be completed.
- We spoke to the Waikato CDEM Group Controller this morning. They have the situation in hand and external support is not required. The Waitomo EOC is activated.

Bay of Plenty

- A house has been damaged by a landslide on Egret Avenue in Maungatapu, Tauranga and the residents evacuated. Building inspectors will be onsite this morning to evaluate the damage.
- Other residents on Egret Avenue were also evacuated overnight due to their houses flooding.
- Waka Kotahi has advised that due to flooding and slips across the Bay of Plenty region. SH3, SH29, SH30, SH41 have sections closed but all have detours in place to allow use of the network.
- SH37 Hangatiki (SH3) to Waitomo Caves between SH37/3 RBA and Fullerton Road is closed due to a slip with no-detour in place.

Here is the latest Ministerial update at noon 29 January

Weather Updates

- Heavy Rain Warning in place for Northland for 22hours with up to 120mm rain in the North and East on top of what has already fallen.
- Heavy Rain warning in place for Coromandel Peninsula until 6pm Sunday with up to 70mm of rain in the ranges on top of what has already fallen, with thunderstorms possible.
- Heavy Rain Watch in place for Auckland, Great Barrier Island, Nelson, Waikato, Waitomo, Taranaki, Marlborough, Nelson with periods of heavy rain and thunderstorms.
- Showers will ease over the upper North Island on Monday, but rain is set to return to Northland and possibly northern Auckland on Tuesday. A warning is likely.

Auckland

- Auckland Emergency Management (AEM) is planning to open another Civil Defence Centre (CDC) in Mangere to assist with impacted persons at 10:00hrs.
- AEM are planning to move the CDC at Kelston School due to the school having to open on Tuesday. Kelston School will remain as an Information Centre.
- More than 130 Building Inspectors are in the field today to begin building inspections across the region. There are approximately 5,000 buildings that will require an inspection across 25 suburbs.
- Drones and aerial reconnaissance flights are being arranged today to assist in identifying other areas that are difficult to access.
- Landslips and other areas of land instability will also be identified as requiring a geotechnical inspection.
- The Airport is now fully operational, for both international and domestic flights. Approximately 533 customers were accommodated overnight in the International terminal and Te Manukanuka O Hoturoa Marae, and were supported by a NZ Rapid Relief Team (RRTs are a service provided by the Plymouth Brethren Church).

- Public Transport: all modes are operating using the Sunday timetable (with exception of the train block of lines) and normal operations are expected today. Pumping of water out of Britomart continues.
- SH1 Puhoi to Warkworth was fully opened overnight with a temporary speed limit in place.
- Chorus has reported widespread areas of faults which are being addressed as power returns to sites. Several telephone exchanges were flooded or damaged but resulted in no impact to services.
- As at 10:00hrs, Vector advised that 98% of flood related outages have been restored with approximately 700 remaining without power, 300 of those are on Kawau Island. They expect these customers, apart from those on Kawau Island, to be restored today.
- The Harbourmaster reports multiple boats partially sunk or on the rocks. They are working with contractors
 to clear today debris in the Waitematā Harbour between Herald Island and Hobsonville.

Waikato

- A state of local emergency remains in place in Waitomo.
- Waikato CDEM Group ECC is activated and monitoring. Waitomo District Council and Thames Coromandel District Council have opened EOC's. Hauraki District Council is looking to open an EOC due to risk of flooding overnight across the region. SH25A Kōpū-Hikuai is closed until further notice. Thames Coast Rd (SH25) is closed between Waiomu and Tapu, and Manaia and Te Rerenga.

Bay of Plenty

- Bay of Plenty Civil Defence hold some concern for the Ngongotaha River due to previous flooding. The river level is dropping but welfare plans are in place.
- There are also multiple road outages across the regions, but they are being handled locally.

Canterbury

- Canterbury CDEM Group and a NZ Rapid Relief Team (RRT) coordinated supply of bottles water, snacks, and blankets to Christchurch Airport for diverted passenge's from Auckland.
- Some Airlines asked passengers to remain at Christchurch Airport in case their flights were rescheduled early.

 Marlborough, Nelson with periods of heavy rain and thunderstorms.
- Severe Thunderstorm Watch for northern Auckland and Northland for 15hrs with the possibility of intensive downpours of up to 40mm per hour.
- Severe Thunderstorm Watch for Manawatu, Tararua, Kapiti-Horowhenua and the Wairarapa regions

Coromandel

- Thames Coromandel District Council have advised via social media that the Coromandel is now isolated and are urging residents to stay off the roads and avoid travel at all costs.
- Current State Highway closures in the region include State Highway 25A Kōpō-Hikuai due to a slip, SH 25 between Whangamatā and Waihi due to flooding as well as Manaia.
- There are also a significant number of local road closures around the region including the 309 road which is closed due to a drop out. The Tapu-Coroglen road and Port Jackson Road are closed due to slips. The intersection of Weka Street and Linden Crescent in Whangamatā is closed due to a tomo (sinkhole).





MetService Weather Update

Weather update at 1700hrs 29 Januar

- Heavy showers and thunderstorms continue for many North Island regions this afternoon, with currently only patchy and moderate falls through Auckland city. Thunderstorms are developing about the North Shore, Albany and across to Massey. A thunderstorm watch remains in force for north Auckland, extending until dawn Monday. These thunderstorms could provide an additional 20-40mm/hr if and where they occur. [Auckland is considering the use of an Emergency Mobile Alert for thunderstorms moving across the city overnight]
- Rain is expected to become heavy and thundery about Northland this evening and into the night. An Orange leavy Rainfall Warning has been issued for Northland and Auckland. Rain in Northland may be persistent, significant, and impactful for an extended period (this evening until Wednesday).
- The Coromandel Peninsula Orange Rainfall Warning is expected to be lifted this evening as rainfall has moderated. Another warning may be required on Wednesday
- An Orange Heavy Rain Warning may be required for Auckland including Great Barrier Island for the next event commencing Wednesday morning.

Auckland

- Auckland Emergency Management has opened a community information hub in M\u00e4ngere at M\u00e4ngere
 Memorial Hall to assist with impacted persons.
- Auckland Emergency Management is reassessing the need to move the Civil Defence Centre at Saint Leonard's Road School, Kelston. We are expecting more information on this tomorrow.

WEATHER

MetService reports Auckland may experience showers today, some heavy. Showers moving north over the day, concerned about the risk of localised downpours tonight and overnight north of Orewa. A heavy rain watch remains in force for all of Auckland and Aotea GBI until 0600hrs Monday 29/01/2023.



SITUATION

Overview

Record-breaking rainfall has impacted almost the entire Auckland region resulting in widespread flooding and landslips. Fire and Emergency New Zealand and the New Zealand Police have responded to over 2000 call outs, which included people trapped in homes and cars as a result of the flooding. Landslips and flooding has closed multiple roads in the region, including sections of both routes north, SH1 and SH16.

Up to 265mm of rain fell in some areas. Central west rainfall amounts broke records for the wettest January and wettest month on record. It was unprecedented in Auckland records. MetService advises more rain is expected over coming days, but not of the length and intensity experienced on January 27th. Heavy but "spotty" localised showers are expected for the next 3 days which may result in further slips/surface water.

There are reports of flooded homes and businesses including rest homes with many evacuations. Three Civil Defence Centres have been opened in the region and will remain open at least overnight on the 28/01/2023.

At 1716hrs, during the first IMT meeting, the emergency services represented advised they had sufficient resources for response activities at that time. The response agencies were advised to alert the Controller if that situation changed. At 2030hrs the NZ Police confirmed they required emergency powers under the CDEM Act to compel the evacuation of people in dangerous situations, or to prevent people returning to unsafe homes. On receipt of that request, the Controller initiated the declaration process with the mayor.

Risk and issues

While the rain has abated, floodwaters and debris are still making travel around the city difficult. Multiple road closures have been impacting the emergency services ability to respond.

The weather caused flooding and damage to multiple CDC sites making locating an appropriate facility challenging. Changes to CDC locations being kept to a minimum but being communicated to the public.

Domestic flights from Auckland Airport will begin at 1200hrs 28/01/2023. No international flights will depart before 0500hrs. There will be no international flights arriving before 0700hrs, 29/01/2023. The number of stranded travellers is expected to decrease as flights are reinstated.

People are trying to return to the region over the long weekend. Road closures and debris may make this difficult.

Police advise there have been three confirmed deaths and one person remains missing in the Auckland region as a result of the flooding and intense rain.

St Johns advised their network has returned to BAU levels of activity following the "Extreme" pressure experienced overnight.

Cultural

The iwi and Māori liaison to the ECC advise they are contacting Ngā Marae and iwi reps for any assistance required by the Māori community. Māori Wardens Emergency Response Teams have been activated and put on standby.

Evacuations

Evacuations and rescues from flooded residences have occurred across the city. If possible, evacuees are recommended to stay with friends or family.

Civil Defence Centres have opened in three locations:

- St. Leonards Road School, 15 Saint Leonard's Road, Kelston
- Massey University Albany Campus, Sir Neil Walters Lecture Theatre, Massey University East Precinct, Albany Expressway SH17
- Mana Tukutuku, 32 Riverton Drive, Randwick Park

A pop-up Community and Agency Information Hub will be opened from 1100-1500hrs, 29-30/01/2023 (further hours to be assessed) at the Mangere Memorial Hall, 23 Domain Rd, Mangere Bridge for community members needing support with access to essential services.

Overnight there were approximately 50 people in the Kelston CDC, 2 in the Massey University CDC, and approximately 5 in the Randwick Park CDC.

Hospitals, medical and specialist care facilities

Health sector liaisons note that while there is damage and debris at some health facilities, which is being addressed, all clinical services are continuing.



Rural sector

Reports of severe flooding and landslips impacting rural areas have been received. The Auckland Group Welfare Coordinator is in contact with MPI and will be reaching out to others in the sector to understand rural impacts.

BUILT ENVIRONMENT

Property (housing, accommodation, commercial, industrial, government, heritage)

FENZ advised that they had 22 active calls as at 0830hrs 28/01/2023 down from approximately 2000 overnight.

Over 130 Auckland Council Building Inspectors and Geotechnical Engineers and 15 additional inspectors from outside of the Auckland region are in the field today following the Rapid Impact Assessment yesterday. They have identified approximately 5000 buildings that will require an inspection across the region (25 suburbs). Drones and aerial reconnaissance flights are being arranged today to assist in identifying other areas that are difficult to access. Landslips and other areas of land instability will also be identified as requiring a geotechnical inspection.

Roading and transportation (local/national roads, rail, sea, air)

Waka Kotahi and Auckland Transport Operations Centre advise SH1 Puhoi to Warkworth was fully opened overnight with a temporary speed limit in place.

Auckland Transport advise closures on 39 surface roads across the region as a result of flood damage or land slips.

Public Transport: All modes are operating using the Sunday timetable (with exception of the train block of lines) and normal operations are expected today. Pumping of water out of Britomart continues.

Ferry services are a little busier today than expected and the only service not running is Rakino (no service tomorrow is expected either).

The Airport is now fully operational, for both international and domestic flights. Approximately 533 customers were accommodated overnight in the International terminal and Te Manukanuka O Hoturoa Marae and were supported by a NZ Rapid Relief Team.

The Harbourmaster reports multiple boats partially sunk or on the rocks. They are working with contractors to clear today debris in the Waitematā Harbour between Herald Island and Hobsonville.

Aotea Great Barrier Island has reported their communities are generally coping well but slips have impacted some main transport routes, these issues have been passed on to Auckland Transport. NZDF reports they have visited an isolated community in Puhoi with no major needs at this time, but the access issues are being investigated today. The Mill Flat Rd bridge in Riverhead has been destroyed, isolating a small community. Contact with the community is continuing with no major needs identified, other than medical access needs for one individual. Access options for restoring the bridge are being identified but the community does have limited access via forestry roads.

Other lifelines (power, fuel, telecommunications, water, sewerage)

Spark advises two cellular sites are using generators with all other cell sites reinstated. Spark advise they are opening up their Wi-Fi hot spots free to any user to assist those displaced. Vodafone advise they have



7 mobile sites down due to lack of power spread across the region. 2Degrees has 7 sites down due to power failure and some water ingress.

Chorus has reported widespread areas of faults which are being addressed as power returns to sites. Several telephone exchanges were flooded or damaged but resulted in no impact to services.

As at 10am, Vector advised that 98% of flood related outages have been restored with approximately 700 remaining without power, 300 of those are on Kawau Island. They expect these customers, apart from those on Kawau Island, to be restored today.

Counties Power advise they have around 20 rural customers without power as a result of power poles down; reinstatement is expected within 24 hours.

Watercare advised that residents in Titirangi, Waiatarua Woodlands Park, Oratia and Green Bay area may have low or no water pressure as a result of a damaged pipe in the area. Time for reinstatement approx. 48hrs from 28/01/2023. Other small outages as a result of damaged pipes have occurred across the region. Watercare is in contact with impacted people. Due to landslips impacting Waitakere water supply dams, Aucklanders are being asked to be mindful of their water use. Mains water remains safe to drink and we are not expecting any issues at Auckland's largest water treatment plants, Ardmore and Waikato.

Wastewater networks and treatment plants have been impacted by stormwater volumes causing overflows at a number of sites. Aucklanders are being asked to reduce water use to lessen impact on the system.

Aucklanders are also being advised to avoid swimming at beaches due to possible contamination, and to follow the SafeSwim website to stay up to date.

Fast moving consumer goods

Countdown supermarkets report that they have one site closed and are experiencing some disruption to online orders and delivery.



NATURAL ENVIRONMENT

Auckland Council has received 57 requests related to damaged trees as a result of the flooding and weather.



ACTIONS

Actions carried out

The Controller has approved the use of aerial reconnaissance flights to assist in damage inspections operations (29/01/2023).

AEM ECC activated to Orange. A declaration of a state of local emergency was made at 2127hrs 27/01/2023.

Three CDCs have been activated and resourcing arranged at least overnight. A decision on whether they should remain open will be made 29/01/2023.

Predicted incident progression

We expect the number of people requiring emergency accommodation to increase as those evacuated return home to survey damage, and the Rapid Damage Assessments and Rapid Building Assessments are completed by the Auckland Council Building Control Teams.



The weather may remain impactful to response operations with isolated but heavy showers expected over the next days.

Needs will likely change as those evacuated and those returning home after the long weekend understand the level of damage in their homes.

Limiting factors

Staffing challenges as a result of the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic and the Auckland Anniversary Long Weekend.

There is limited supply for emergency accommodation in Auckland as a result of the Elton John concerts and other events of the Auckland Anniversary Weekend with most accommodation providers at capacity. If the need for emergency accommodation increases this may present some additional challenges. MBIE and NEMA have assisted in sourcing additional accommodation to offer to those displaced.

Some evacuated persons are being dropped at local hospitals putting pressure on the health system already stretched as a result of the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic.

Intended actions

An alternate site for the CDC in St Leonard's Rd is being planned due to the return to school on Tuesday. Preparing for a potential surge in response operations including the number and location of CDCs.

Auckland Council plan to inspect three areas using drones in areas focusing on hard-to-access watercourses and known landslips in west Auckland and the North Shore.

Auckland Emergency Management Response Teams continue to respond to requests for assistance.

The CDCs will be open and staffed overnight on the 28/01/2023. Cleaning, security and catering has been arranged for all sites.



Resources in place

FENZ, NZ Police, St Johns, MetService and NEMA liaisons are present in the ECC today.

Two AEM staff at each of the 3 CDCs supported by Red Cross.

Approximately 130 Auckland Council Building Inspectors supported by 15 inspectors from outside the region are beginning building inspections today.

Resources required

Accommodation for those evacuated and those unable to return to their homes remains the largest resource requirement. Opportunities using Auckland Council Facilities are also being explored.

Staffing requirements are being identifying and channelled through NEMA.

St Johns advised their network has returned to BAU levels of activity following the "Extreme" pressure experienced overnight.

Cultural

The iwi and Māori liaison to the ECC are contacting Ngā Marae and iwi reps for any assistance required by the Māori community. Māori Wardens Emergency Response Teams have been activated and put on standby.

Iwi liaisons are contacting all marae and iwi in the region to assess their situation. Some needs have been identified through the marae are logistics are working to address them.

Evacuations

Evacuations and rescues from flooded residences have occurred across the city. If possible, evacuees are recommended to stay with friends or family.

Civil Defence Centres have opened in three locations:

- St. Leonards Road School, 15 Saint Leonard's Road, Kelston
- Massey University Albany Campus, Sir Neil Walters Lecture Theatre, Massey University East Precinct, Albany Expressway SH17
- Mana Tukutuku, 32 Riverton Drive, Randwick Park

A Community and Agency Information Hub will be opened all night 29/01/2023 (further hours to be assessed) at the Mangere Memorial Hall, 23 Domain Rd, Mangere Bridge for community members needing support with access to essential services.



Overnight there were approximately 32 people in the Kelston CDC, 15 in the Massey University CDC, and approximately 15 in the Randwick Park CDC.

Ministry of Social Development

Ministry of Social Development (MSD) call centre have taken 3,800 calls and completed 1,700 appointments. They continue to support impacted people and find them alternate accommodation.

Hospitals, medical and specialist care facilities

There has been no significant impact to clinical services – all hospitals, primary and community care services including emergency departments and urgent care clinics remain open.

Rural sector

Reports of severe flooding and landslips impacting rural areas have been received. The Auckland Group Welfare Coordinator is in contact with MPI and Rural Brigades of Fire and Emergency New Zealand and will be reaching out to others in the sector to understand rural impacts.

Other animal welfare issues

Not yet reported.



BUILT ENVIRONMENT

Property (housing, accommodation, commercial, industrial, government, heritage)

FENZ advise that call volumes and incident volumes have decreased from the peak numbers (2,000) on Friday night but are still high. For the 24 hours on Saturday, 28 January 2023 FENZ attended 333 call outs in Auckland which including 18 rescues of people, 17 priority one incidents (where there is confirmed risk to people) & 110 priority two incidents (where there is a potential risk to people).

Over 130 Auckland Council Building Inspectors and Geotechnical Engineers and 15 additional inspectors from outside of the Auckland region are in the field today following the Rapid Impact Assessment yesterday. They have identified approximately 5,000 buildings that will require an inspection across the region (25 suburbs). Drones and aerial reconnaissance flights are being arranged today to assist in identifying other areas that are difficult to access. Landslips and other areas of land instability will also be identified as requiring a geotechnical inspection.

As at 1430hrs, 25 red placards, 17 yellow placards, and 114 white placards have been issued. Other sites have been visited but not inspected if water ingress was not identified. These are located across the city and a mixture of flooding and slip-related damage.

Roading and transportation (local/national roads, rail, sea, air)

Waka Kotahi and Auckland Transport Operations Centre advise SH1 Puhoi to Warkworth was fully opened overnight with a temporary speed limit in place.

Auckland Transport advise closures on 39 38 surface roads across the region as a result of flood damage or land slips. Road closures are now being reported via the Auckland Transport website.

Public Transport: All modes are operating using the Sunday timetable (with exception of the train block of lines) and normal operations are expected today. Pumping of water out of Britomart continues.

Ferry services are a little busier today than expected and the only service not running is Rakino (no service tomorrow is expected either).



The Airport is now fully operational, for both international and domestic flights. Approximately 533 customers were accommodated overnight in the international terminal and Te Manukanuka O Hoturoa Marae and were supported by a NZ Rapid Relief Team.

The Harbourmaster reports multiple boats partially sunk or on the rocks and significant debris and timber in the Waitemata Harbour, particularly between Herald Island and Hobsonville. They are working with contractors to clear this debris.

Aotea Great Barrier Island has reported their communities are generally coping well but slips have impacted some main transport routes, these issues have been passed on to Auckland Transport. NZDF reports they have visited an isolated community in Puhoi with no major needs at this time, but the access issues are being investigated today. The Mill Flat Rd bridge in Riverhead has been destroyed, isolating a small community. Contact with the community is continuing with no major needs identified, other than medical access needs for one individual. Access options for restoring the bridge are being identified but the community does have limited 4WD access via forestry roads.

Other lifelines (power, fuel, telecommunications, water, sewerage)

Spark advises two cellular sites are using generators with all other cell sites reinstated. Spark advise they are opening up their Wi-Fi hot spots free to any user to assist those displaced Vodafone advise they have 7 mobile sites down due to lack of power spread across the region. 2Degrees has 7 sites down due to power failure and some water ingress.

Chorus has reported widespread areas of faults which are being addressed as power returns to sites. Several telephone exchanges were flooded or damaged but resulted in no impact to services.

As at 10am, Vector advised that 98% of flood related outages have been restored with approximately 700 remaining without power, 300 of those are on Kawau Island. They expect these customers, apart from those on Kawau Island, to be restored today.

Counties Power advise there were multiple outages with around 1200 customers without power in the Drury area and multiple isolated single property outages. The majority of these have been resolved, with the remaining 41 properties expected to be resolved by nightfall.

Watercare advised that residents in Titirangi, Waiatarua Woodlands Park, Oratia and Green Bay area may have low or no water pressure as a result of a damaged pipe in the area. Time for reinstatement approx. 48hrs from 28/01/2023. Other small outages as a result of damaged pipes have occurred across the region. Watercare is in contact with impacted people. Due to landslips impacting Waitakere water supply dams, resulting in the Upper and Lower Nihotupu Dams being taken offline due to sedimentation. Aucklanders are being asked to be mindful of their water use. Mains water remains safe to drink and we are not expecting any issues at Auckland's largest water treatment plants, Ardmore and Waikato.

Wastewater networks and treatment plants have been impacted by stormwater volumes causing overflows at a number of sites. Aucklanders are being asked to reduce water use to lessen impact on the system.

Aucklanders are also being advised to avoid swimming at beaches due to possible contamination, and to follow the SafeSwim website to stay up to date.

Fast moving consumer goods

Countdown supermarkets report that they have one site closed and are experiencing some disruption to online orders and delivery.

All but three PAK'n'SAVE, New World and Four-Square stores have been reopened. There are no Auckland Regional supply issues. Normal supply to the Northland area is expected to be fully restored tonight.



NATURAL ENVIRONMENT



Since Friday, 125 tree related jobs have been received by council. Of these, 66 were classed as critical. Contractors undertaking the required work advise work volumes are under control.



Actions carried out

The Controller has approved the use of aerial reconnaissance flights to assist in damage inspections operations (29/01/2023).

AEM ECC activated to Orange. A declaration of a state of local emergency was made at 2127hrs 27/01/2023.

Three CDCs have been activated and resourcing arranged at least overnight. A decision on whether they should remain open will be made 29/01/2023.

The Controller has directed the Community and Agency Information Hub be supported to remain open overnight tonight (29/01/2023)

Predicted incident progression

We expect the number of people requiring emergency accommodation to increase as those evacuated return home to survey damage, and the Rapid Damage Assessments and Rapid Building Assessments are completed by the Auckland Council Building Control Teams.

The weather expected overnight may cause additional flooding and land slips. Messaging is being prepared to inform the public of the risk.

Needs will likely change as those evacuated and those returning home after the long weekend understand the level of damage in their homes.

Limiting factors

Staffing challenges as a result of the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic and the Auckland Anniversary Long Weekend.

There is limited supply for emergency accommodation in Auckland as a result of concerts and other events of the Auckland Anniversary Weekend with most accommodation providers at capacity. If the need for emergency accommodation increases this may present some additional challenges. MBIE and NEMA have assisted in sourcing additional accommodation to offer to those displaced.

Some evacuated persons are being dropped at local hospitals putting pressure on the health system already stretched as a result of the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic.

Intended actions

With the pending start to the school term, an alternate site for the CDC at St Leonard's Rd School is being planned. The school has delayed its return until next week.

Preparing for a potential surge in response operations including the number and location of CDCs.

Auckland Council plan to inspect three areas using drones in areas focusing on hard-to-access watercourses and known landslips in west Auckland and the North Shore.

Auckland Emergency Management Response Teams continue to respond to requests for assistance.

The CDCs will be open and staffed overnight on the 29/01/2023. Cleaning, security and catering has been arranged for all sites.



Public Information is working on proactive comms to provide further detail on some of the response elements.

There are 3 media stand ups planned for the 30/01/2023 at 0800, 1300, and 1600hrs.



Resources in place

FENZ, NZ Police, St Johns, MetService and NEMA liaisons are present in the ECC today.

Two AEM staff at each of the 3 CDCs supported by Red Cross.

Approximately 130 Auckland Council Building Inspectors supported by 15 inspectors from outside the region are beginning building inspections today.

Resources required

Accommodation for those evacuated and those unable to return to their homes remains the largest resource requirement. Opportunities using Auckland Council Facilities are also being explored.

Staffing requirements are being identifying and channelled through NEMA.

Kia ora PM and Minister,

Here is the latest update as at 0500hrs.

MetService Weather Update

Overnight:

- Periods of heavy rain and thunderstorms produced 20-50mm about parts of Auckland, Coromandel Peninsula and northern Walkato. Heaviest falls north of Orewa, and about the Waitakere and Hunua ranges. Rain will ease this morning.
- Periods of heavy rain and thunderstorms produced 10-30mm about parts of Northland. Further periods of heavy rain expected this morning.
- Lighter rain or showers affected other parts of Waikato, Waitomo and Bay of Plenty.

Today (Monday):

- The Orange Rain Warning for Auckland ends at 7am this morning, then just a few light showers through the
 - The Orange Rain Warning for Northland ends at midday today.
 - Isolated afternoon and evening thunderstorms over the southern North Island and northern South Island may produce a few downpours, but these will be localised and not widespread. This may require a Severe Thunderstorm Watch.

Outlook:

- Another band of heavy rain and thunderstorms is expected to affect Northland on Tuesday, and Auckland,
 Coromandel Peninsula, Bay of Plenty, Waikato, Waitomo and Taranaki later Tuesday and Wednesday.
- A new set of Orange Rain Warnings and/or Watches are likely to be issued this morning for this next period
 of heavy rain.
- Further showers will affect the northern half of the North Island on Thursday and Friday, then better conditions are expected on Saturday.
- A period of heavy rain affecting the South Island West Coast on Thursday and Friday will likely require an Orange Rain Warning later this week.

Auckland

- NEMA's Director of Emergency Management travelled to Auckland yesterday (Sunday).
- Auckland Emergency Management issued an Emergency Mobile Alert at 1947hrs yesterday regarding thunderstorm warnings and advice with dealing with flooding.
- Auckland Emergency Management is reassessing the need to move the Civil Defence Centre at Saint Leonard's Road School, Kelston. We are expecting more information on this today.
- An updated AoG fact sheet containing information on what support and help is available was published yesterday (v2). It is available from www.civildefence.govt.nz LINK HERE
- Auckland Airport is looking at ways of reducing congestion within the International Terminal. Around 400 displaced passengers stayed in the airport terminal overnight. The Te Manukanuka o Hoturoa marae accommodated approximately 30 passengers. NEMA will continue to encourage Auckland Airport and Emergency Management to scale up support for passengers as it may be needed for several days.

Waikato (including Coromandel)

- Waikato CDEM Group Emergency Coordination Centre is activated.
- We have not received an update overnight about Thames Coromandel; we anticipate there will still be a number of road closures.

Bay of Plenty

- Bay of Plenty Group Emergency Coordination Centre is monitoring the situation
- SH29 Tauranga to Te Poi is now open

 The Bay of Plenty Flood management team is monitoring the lower Kaituna flood scheme in relation to stock bank seepage; if the stock bank fails a property will need to be evacuated along with livestock and farm workers.



Public safety messages

- Further severe weather is expected and there is damage in many areas. Put safety first. Don't take any chances. Act quickly if you see rising water.
- Please stay home if possible and avoid travel— If it is safe to, please stay home. If you must travel, please take extra care on the roads and never drive through flood waters.

- Don't walk, swim, or play in flood water. In addition to the danger of drowning, flood water can contain hidden debris, chemicals, animal waste and human sewage that can make you sick.
- If you have to evacuate bring with you any essential items you may need including medication, warm clothing and baby items.
- Take your pets with you when you evacuate if it's not safe for you, it's not safe for them.
- If you have been evacuated, it may not be safe to return home even when the floodwaters have receded. Listen to emergency services and local Civil Defence authorities and don't return home until they tell you is safe to do so.
- This will be an unsettling time for many people. Please look after each other, put safety first, and listen to the advice of civil defence and emergency services.

Water supply and wastewater network

Watercare's water treatment plants are operating and your water is safe to drink.

Residents living in Titirangi, Woodlands Park, Oratia, Greenbay, Waima and elevated sections of Scenic Drive are likely to have no water or low water pressure for at least the next 48 hours.

A 30-metre-long section of water pipe that ran along Scenic Drive in Titirangi was washed away with the road due to a landslide. It will be challenging to repair due to the extent of the damage and access to the site.

Watercare is sending out water tankers to the area. Customers will be able to fill up their water bottles from the tankers.

Residents on the North Shore are asked to reduce their water use. Please keep your showers short and do not use your washing machines. This is to reduce the volume of wastewater leaving your properties.

A wastewater pump station on Wairau Road that serves several suburbs on the North Shore has been flooded. This means the pump station is overflowing into a nearby waterway.

The wastewater networks and treatment plants have been overwhelmed by stormwater, causing numerous overflows across Auckland.

Watercare is prioritising overflows that are damaging private property. Most of the clean-up activity will need to occur when the rain stops, as this is when the overflows will stop flowing.

Cleaning up after a flood

It is important to clean and dry your house and everything in it. Floodwater may contain sewage and other hazardous materials which can contaminate your home.

- If your gas meter has been affected by water or debris, contact your gas supplier.
- Always work safely when cleaning up after a flood by wearing protective clothing and washing hands thoroughly after clean-up and before handling food.
- Keep children and animals away from previously flooded areas until they have been cleaned and made safe.
- Take photos and videos of the damage and anything that needs to be thrown away before star ing the clean-up, for insurance purposes.
- Clean up, drain, and dry inside as quickly as possible. Take out everything that is wet and that can be moved – floor coverings, furniture, bedding, clothing, etc., and put them outside to dry when the weather is fine.
- Throw away all food and drinking water that has come in contact with floodwater, including things stored in containers.
- Do not eat garden produce if the soil has been flooded. Clean up and remove debris and sprinkle gardens with lime.

Civil Defence Payments

- emergency food, clothing and bedding if yours has been damaged or destroyed.
- accommodation costs if you have been evacuated and are staying in accommodation such as a motel, hotel or temporary rental accommodation.
- loss of income due to an inability to work caused by the flooding.
- A payment if you have evacuees staying with you in places such as a private home, marae or community centres.

Insurance and lodging a claim

If your home, car, or contents have been damaged by the severe weather, take photos before you remove or repair anything and report it to your insurance company as soon as possible. You only need to contact your insurance company and they'll let you know what you need to do next, how to claim and – if applicable – how EQ Cover from Toka Tū Ake EQC works.

If you need to make your home safe, sanitary, secure, and weather tight, please record the work done, take before and after photos, and keep copies of the bills you paid.

If you are an uninsured homeowner, contact the EOC Welfare team on 03 543 7290 (After hours 03 546 0200).

If you don't have house insurance but do have contents insurance, speak to your insurer about what is covered. Make sure you take lots of photos and keep good records before you throw anything out, where possible.

The <u>Residential Advisory Service</u> (RAS) within MBIE provide advocacy services and advice to homeowners who are navigating insurance claims to remediate damage suffered due to an event. You can contact <u>info@advisory.org.nz</u> or ring 0800 777 299, 03 379 7027 for more information.

North Island Severe Weather

Severe Weather Update

An orange heavy rain warning is in place for Northland, and Auckland until 30 January, localised areas may receive an additional 150mm on top of what has already fallen in Northland and Auckland

Heavy rain watches remain in place for Tasman northwest of Motueka and the Richmond and Bryant Ranges, Rai Valley area and Marlborough Sounds until 1500hrs Monday 30 January.

A slow-moving low is expected to move south over the Tasman Sea from Wednesday 1 February through till Friday 3 February.

MetService have high confidence that rainfall amounts will reach criteria for a heavy rain warning to be issued in Northland on Tuesday, during Wednesday 1 February, MetService has a moderate confidence that rainfall will reach criteria for a heavy rain warning in Auckland.

This expected rain may affect already impacted areas of the upper North Island, causing further flooding and slips on already saturated grounds.

Auckland

Rain has eased in Auckland; however, flooding is still present. The state of local emergency declared at 2127hrs Friday 27 January remains in place. The Auckland Emergency Coordination Centre (ECC) remains active. There is seven EMAT personnel, and five NEMA deployed personnel at the ECC providing support.

Auckland Emergency Management has three Civil Defence Centres and a community information hub open to assist with impacted persons. More than 130 Building Inspectors were in the field yesterday to begin building inspections across the region. There are approximately 5000 buildings that will require an inspection across 25 suburbs. Landslips and other areas of land instability will also be identified as requiring a geotechnical inspection. Auckland Airport is now fully operational, for both international and domestic flights, however there is congestion for passengers due to manual check-in's taking place. An Emergency Mobile Alert (EMA) was sent by Auckland Emergency Management at 1947hrs last night advising the Auckland public of severe thunderstorm activity.

Waikato

Waitomo District Council declared a state of local emergency for the Waitomo District at 1905hrs on Saturday 28 January. An EOC has been activated in the Waitomo District and Te Kūiti Pā have received people who needed to evacuate their homes and are awaiting accommodation. Multiple roads are still impacted across the region due to slips and flooding.

Bay of Plenty

The Bay of Plenty CDEM Group Duty Team at the Group Emergency Coordination Centre (GECC) have been monitoring the situation throughout the event. A large slip occurred in Maungatapu at Egret Avenue, Tauranga. One house suffered severe damage with two others significantly impacted. Police and FENZ evacuated approximately 20 homes on Egret Ave and Te Mutu Crescent with all evacuees able to stay with friends/relatives. Due to slips and flooding, there has been several road closures around Tauranga City, these are being managed by council contractors who have been working to clear sites since Sunday.

AEM is currently assessing the need for and location of hubs, working alongside the Welfare Coordination Group.

NEMA NCC is working alongside Auckland EM to translate the All of Government factsheet to enable the provision of support.

The National Welfare Coordination Group and the Auckland Welfare Coordinat on Group continue to meet daily with agency representation for our elderly and disabled communities to ensure our welfare services are fir for purpose.

How are volunteers being coordinated?

Auckland Emergency Management is coordinating volunteers, including Student Volunteer Army. Tasks being investigated for volunteers include clean up (including faith based organisations.

How are donations being coordinated?

Auckland Emergency Management are working on developing the criteria for and managing the Mayoral Relief Fund.

Specifically, how is the response going in Mangere?

Two community-led centres with Auckland Emergency Management support have been set up in Mangere to support this community. Auckland EM will assess whether additional support is required for this community today.

- Building Assessors are following up with more detailed impact assessments. Numbers
 provided reflect situation on the ground on the ground this morning and are in high flux.
 Approximately 11% of affected properties have been assessed. From the inspections made
 so far, 40 red placards, 151 yellow placards.

Welfare

- The number of people displaced in Auckland is still unknown as most people are recommended to stay with friends or family. 75 people presented to evacuation centres overnight.
- Welfare needs are still under assessment, with 372 assessments completed. 347 people have requested accommodation. Approximately 400 people sheltered overnight in the Auckland Airport International terminal, with similar numbers expected today.
- 3 evacuations Centres are open, with a community and agency information hub open all night at Mangare Memorial Hall

The following issues would be useful to raise with AEM and Council staff. These are not in any particular order.

- Welfare support at Auckland Airport for pax with disrupted and delayed travel. These costs are eligible if support is directed by the Controller, and failure to provide adequate facilities by either AEM or AIAL presents reputational and welfare risks
- 2. Needs assessment and mis-alignment with building and USAR assessment, exacerbated by lack of common platforms and interoperability
- Community Information hubs / one stop shop. Additional facilities will be needed beyond the unit established today in Mangare
- 4. Ensuring CALD support is available, deployed and visible across CDC, hubs and in resources. \$ 9(2)(g)(i)
- 5. There is a need to ensure that community organisations are appropriately briefed and tasked with regard to ensuring they are eligible for reimbursement. They can only be reimbursed if officially tasked
- 6. Community led centres how many? Where are they? Do they need support? There is no information available

- 7. Debris Management. This will require extensive planning, operational support and public communication
- 8. Recovery needs to be planned and resourced now, and should eb starting concurrently
- 9. Establishment of Mayoral relief fund and associated criteria
- 10. Enhanced taskforce green via MSD would be an option however the Council needs to do the coordination of this and could be extensive, however MPI are open to discuss this.

Below is the Ministerial Update at 1200hrs 30 January. The numbers are changing frequently.

MetService Weather Update as at 1100hrs

Today – Monday 30 January 2023:

- Heavy showers and thunderstorms were observed last night for Northland and Auckland (north of the Harbour Bridge) where typically 40-80mm was recorded. Thunderstorms boosted rainfall accumulations to 100mm between Snells Beach and Wellsford and immediately south of Moerewa in Northland
- The rain is expected to continue to ease in **Northland** and **Auckland** today, but isolated thunderstorm are possible this afternoon and evening.

Tomorrow - Tuesday 31 January 2023:

- An Orange Heavy Rainfall Warning has been issued for Northland and Auckland starting early morning
 Tuesday (3-4am) extending into Wednesday. Rain in Northland may be persistent, significant, and impactful
 for this period, with event rainfall exceedance of 180mm likely, and some places could see 200mm+ in
 accompanying thunderstorms. Northern Auckland and Great Barrier Island may see between 80-120mm for
 the event, with (much) lighter falls further south.
- Northeast winds strengthening with gusts of 90 km/h possible in exposed places, which may impact Auckland Harbour Bridge and arterial roads.

Outlook:

- The **Coromandel Peninsula** and **western Bay of Plenty** will likely see another Orange Rainfall Warning on Wednesday.
- This may extend eastward to affect **Whakatane** and **Rotorua** late Wednesday.
- Very warm and humid temperatures continue for the North Island this week, with overnight temperatures likely more than 19-20C for western and northern regions and daytime temperature between 22-27C.
- From Friday the weather in the north should ease to isolated showers, and improving conditions remain into the new week following the Waitangi holiday for affected regions.

Auckland

- Rain overnight caused tree failure and additional slips in Titirangi, resulting in evacuations of residents.
- The number of people displaced in Auckland is still unknown; advice was to stay with friends or family.
- Approximately 82 people were accommodated in Civil Defence Centres overnight and 82 people moved to emergency accommodation.
- Overnight Auckland Council received over 148 requests for service due to flooding impacts with only two
 related to water in housing. FENZ handled all calls within BAU.

- Helicopter surveillance identified 50 inaccessible sites that require rapid building inspections.
- Auckland Emergency Management Welfare are working with Auckland International Airport and Ministry of Transport to relieve pressure with stranded international passengers.
- Kawau Bay have 300 properties without power due to damaged power lines; Auckland Emergency Management are looking at generator and welfare support for residents.
- The best estimate of the number of properties potentially impacted remains at 5000.
- USAR teams are undertaking rapid damage assessments, which the first indicator of damage and suitability
 of habitation. 289 assessments have been undertaken, with 13 assessed as yellow and 59 red.
- Building Assessors are following up with more detailed impact assessments. Numbers provided reflect the situation on the ground this morning and are in high flux. Approximately 11% of affected properties have been assessed. From the inspections made so far, 40 red placards, 151 yellow placards.
- Welfare needs are still under assessment, with 372 assessments completed. 347 people have requested
 accommodation. Approximately 400 people sheltered overnight in the Auckla d Airport International
 terminal, with similar numbers expected today.
- 3 Evacuations Centre are open, with a Community and Agency Information Hub open all night at Mangere Memorial Hall

Waikato

- Waitomo District Council has lifted their state of local emergency declaration as at 0937hrs Monday 30
 January.
- Waikato CDEM Group Emergency Coordination Centre and four Emergency Operation Centres are activated monitoring ongoing weather impacts.

Bay of Plenty

- Approximately 30 prope ties are isolated in Western Bay of Plenty due to a bridge washout.
- The Ngongotaha River level has receded but still a concern with forecasted weather.

Public safety messages

- Further severe weather is expected and there is damage in many areas. Put safety first. Don't take any chances. Act quickly if you see rising water.
- Please stay home if possible and avoid travel— If it is safe to, please stay home. If you must travel, please take extra care on the roads and never drive through flood waters.
- Don't walk, swim, or play in flood water In addition to the danger of drowning, flood water can contain hidden debris, chemicals, animal waste and human sewage that can make you sick.
- If you have to evacuate bring with you any essential items you may need including medication, warm clothing and baby items.
- Take your pets with you when you evacuate if it's not safe for you, it's not safe for them.
- If you have been evacuated, it may not be safe to return home even when the floodwaters have receded.
 Listen to emergency services and local Civil Defence authorities and don't return home until they tell you it is safe to do so.
- This will be an unsettling time for many people. Please look after each other, put safety first, and listen to the advice of civil defence and emergency services.



- 1. You are talking to two oral items at Cabinet on Tuesday 31 January 2023:
 - a. Oral item 1 provides an update to Cabinet on the impacts of the severe weather event across the North Island, particularly the Auckland Region.
 - b. Oral item 2 provides an update to Cabinet on what is planned regarding a review into the Auckland flooding response.

Oral item 1: Update on North Island severe weather event (focus on Auckland)

- Auckland was the most affected region, however other regions such as Waikato and the Bay of Plenty were also affected.
- 3. On Saturday 28 January, you announced an initial Government contribution of \$100,000 (excl. GST) to establish the Auckland Mayoral Relief Fund and signalled that more support is expected to follow.
- 4. This is in addition to other government financial support provided to the region, such as the Ministry of Social Development civil defence payments.
- 5. The Minister of Finance has indicated his interest in providing an additional \$1 million from between Budget contingency to support Auckland.
- 6. We recommend that this additional funding be allocated to the Auckland Council Mayoral Relief Fund to support immediate needs.

Oral item 2: Auckland flooding response review

7. Current NEMA capacity is focused on supporting the immediate response. However, as part of its continuous improvement processes, NEMA is capturing live lessons learned during the response phase. We expect these to result in actions for targeted system support to improve responses to future events.

Kia ora PM and Minister,

This is the 1600hrs update:

MetService Weather Update at 1515hrs

Today – Monday afternoon into evening:

The rain is continuing to ease in Northland and Auckland, and no thunderstorms are currently (1515hrs) detected. Rainfall rates are typically 0.5-2mm/hr.

Hicial

· We are in a brief 'quiet' period prior to the next bout of significant weather.

Tomorrow - Tuesday 31 January 2023:

- The Orange Heavy Rainfall Warning for Northland will escalate to RED Severe Weather Warning today as
 this event will be impactful, potentially further adding to already saturated lands. Northland is expected to
 see 120-140mm of rain for the event, most likely in the east and north. Some places could see 200mm+ in
 accompanying thunderstorms. This event will start before dawn Tuesday, then easing in the north Tuesday
 night before clearing early Wednesday.
 - Auckland City will remain on an Orange Severe Rainfall Warning at this stage. Northern Auckland (north of Orewa) will escalated to RED Severe Weather Warning and may see around 80-120mm, and 50-80mm for northern parts of Auckland City. This event is expected to start Tuesday evening, easing Wednesday morning.
- Escalation to RED Severe Weather Warning is based on discussions with local authorities and likely significant public and infrastructural impact on already saturated terrain.

 Northeast winds strengthening with gusts of 90 km/h possible in exposed places from Northland to northern Coromandel, which may impact Auckland Harbour Bridge and arterial roads Tuesday afternoon and evening.

Outlook:

- The **Coromandel Peninsula** will go to a **RED** Severe Weather Warning today in response to the current roading and saturation issues. **Western Bay of Plenty** have upgraded to an Orange Rainfall Warning. This event will start around midnight on Tuesday and extend into Wednesday.
- Rain and warnings may extend eastward to affect Whakatane and Rotorua late Wednesday.
- From Friday, the weather in the north should ease to isolated showers and improving conditions (sunshine) return into the new week following the Waitangi holiday for all affected regions.

Auckland

- Bad weather is expected to continue to impact the region, particularly on Tue day evening, Auckland Emergency Management is preparing to support additional operations that may be required as a result.
- Iwi liaisons are contacting all marae and iwi in the region to assess their situation. Some needs have been identified through the marae and Auckland Emergency Management logistics are working to address them.
- Auckland Emergency Management is working with Auckland Transport Operations Centre (ATOC) and
 Ministry of Education (MOE) on consideration of advice to MOE and wider community on schools opening
 and the return to work on Tuesday due to weather risk and currently compromised roading network and
 buildings. (AEM hasn't yet decided if they will recommend work from home).
- Overnight the Community and Agency Information Hub at M\u00e4ngere Memorial Hall distributed 150 food packs and 120 medical packs. Additionally, 50 people were seen by Ministry of Social Development teams present in the centre.
- As at 0900hrs, 40 red placards, 151 yellow placards, and 366 white placards have been issued as part of rapid building inspections.
- Waka Kotahi and Auckland Transport Operations Centre (ATOC) advise SH1 is remains closed north of the region near Brynderwyn SH16 is closed near Woodhill due to flooding, alternative routes are in place.
- Auckland Transport advise that over 70 slips have been reported and they are working to visit and triage all sites so they can be rectified promptly.
- Buses are operating at close to normal timetables. A slip in Parnell may impact train schedules for Tuesday.
- Both the Western and Eastern Train lines will be open, although both will be impacted with journey times extended or reduced service levels.
- Ferry services at Hobsonville remain impacted by debris.
- A Bailey bridge is expected onsite at Mill Flat Road in Riverhead Monday night or Tuesday morning. Limited 4WD access remains for the community via forestry roads.
- Vector report a slip on Paturoa Road, Titirangi has restricted access to resolve 32 customers who remain without power.

- Watercare treatment plants at Pukekohe and Helensville are offline although there is expected to be no impact for users.
- Healthy Waters has advised that all Auckland beaches have been moved to "black" status on the SafeSwim
 website and are not recommended for swimming.
- AEM's three CDC's remain open 30/01/2023 and planning is underway for their ongoing support.
- NEMA has deployed 22 staff to help Auckland (a combination of NEMA, Emergency Management Assistance Team and Civil Defence staff). Today we received requests for a further 25 staff.

Northland

- Northland CDEM continue to monitor the severe weather warning and watch currently in place for Northland.
- At 1000hrs, two rivers had reached warning levels of flooding and the gauges at Wairua indicated flooding (detail on locations is available if required).

Waikato (including Coromandel)

- Waitomo District Council lifted their state of local emergency declaration at 9:37am Monday 30 January.
- Waikato CDEM Group Emergency Coordination Centre and five Emergency Operation Centres are activated.
- No isolated townships but some isolated pockets in the region.
- There are seven State Highway road closure points and 18 local road closure points across the region.
- There is concern that the Waikato River will continue to rise. Waikato CDEM Group has sourced more sandbags as a precaution.
- 19 river sites are above flood warning level.
- Approximately 75 properties without power across the region.
- 28 buildings have been impacted by flooding.

Bay of Plenty

- Approximately 30 properties are isolated in Western Bay of Plenty due to a bridge washout.
- The Ngongotaha River level has receded but still a concern with forecasted weather.
- Clean-up from the severe weather event is underway but the Bay of Plenty CDEM Group will continue to liaise with MetService and undertake contingency planning for the next weather front which is forecast to impact the region from Wednesday onwards.

Public safety messages

- Further severe weather is expected over the next few days. Put safety first. Don't take any chances. Act quickly if you see rising water.
- Please plan your journey if you have to travel and only use roads if it is safe to do so. Never drive through flood waters.
- Don't walk, swim, or play in flood water. In addition to the danger of drowning, flood water can contain hidden debris, chemicals, animal waste and human sewage that can make you sick.
- Only return home after Civil Defence and emergency services have told you it is safe to do so. It may not be safe to return home even when the floodwaters have receded.
- Stay away from damaged areas. You might hamper rescue and other emergency operations and be at further risk from the residual effects of floods.
- Help others if you can, especially people who may need extra help.

Cleaning up after a flood

- Clean and dry your house and everything in it. Floodwater can make the air in your home unhealthy. When
 things get wet for more than two days they usually get mouldy. There may also be germs and bugs in your
 home after a flood.
- Mould may make some people with asthma, allergies or other breathing problems sick. Please use personal
 protective equipment to protect yourself and others from harm.

Evacuation Advice

- If you have to evacuate bring with you any essential items you may need including medication, warm clothing and baby items.
- Take your pets with you when you evacuate if it's not safe for you, it's not safe for them
- If you have been evacuated, it may not be safe to return home even when the floodwaters have receded. Listen to emergency services and local Civil Defence authorities and don't return home until they tell you it is safe to do so.
- This will be an unsettling time for many people. Please look after each other, put safety first, and listen to the advice of civil defence and emergency services.

Earlier today the National Emergency Management Agency (NEMA) asked us to take action to help minimise traffic movement on Auckland roads while vital infrastructure is urgently repaired.

With the possibility of further weather damage leading to more disruption, the Secretary for Education has directed that schools, kura, early learning services and Tertiary institutions in the Auckland region (Wellsford to Pukekohe) must close for physical attendance and instruction until 7 February. Schools and kura can open or remain open for onsite instruction but need to provide distance learning.

Schools and kura can open or remain open for onsite instruction but need to provide distance learning. Early Learning Services may allow the physical attendance of any child whose parent needs them to do so, in the same that we did for COVID, but must otherwise be closed.

Principals and education leaders have done a fantastic job of readying their schools for opening, and I know that this decision will be upsetting for some of them and for some parents.

NEMA will be announcing this decision formally.

I know this is a late announcement that will cause disruption and I thank the sector in advance. We need to get Tamaki Makaurau back up and running as quickly as possible.

In terms of payments etc we will use the same approaches as with COVID.

Here's today's 0600hrs update:

MetService Weather Update at 0500hrss

Overnight:

- Light rain (mostly) affected areas from Hamilton and Tauranga northwards, but rainfall rates increasing after 4am (especially Northland).
- No significant falls, but 20-30mm on Coromandel Peninsula.

Today (Tuesday

- Northland RED warning from 3am Tuesday to 6am Wednesday. Heaviest falls expected from this afternoon. Severe Thunderstorm Watch also in force.
- Auckland RED warning north of Orewa from 4pm Tuesday, ORANGE Warning elsewhere. Heaviest falls likely tonight.
- Northland and Auckland Strong Wind Watch for northeast winds.
- Coromandel Peninsula RED warning from 7pm Tuesday. Heaviest falls expected overnight and Wednesday morning.

• Inland Canterbury, Otago and Southland – Isolated afternoon and evening thunderstorms with localised downpours. May require Severe Thunderstorm Watch.

Outlook:

- Bay of Plenty ORANGE warning from 3am Wednesday to 3am Thursday. May need to be extended into later Thursday or Friday.
- Auckland and Coromandel Peninsula Heavy rain continues into Wednesday morning, then easing.
- Northland, Auckland and Coromandel Peninsula Further rain or showers later Thursday and Friday
 morning may require Heavy Rain Watch (or low-level Warning) given sensitivity. Settled weather expected
 over the weekend.
- **South Island West Coast** Heavy rain on Thursday and Friday, and again later in the weekend, will probably require Orange warnings for Westland and northern Fiordland.

Emergency Services Update - Fire and Emergency New Zealand

 Overnight FENZ attended 6 weather related incidents in the Bay of Plenty Waikato, Auckland and Northland areas. None of these events involved people requiring to be rescued.

Auckland

- The Secretary for Education has directed that schools kura, early learning services and tertiary institutions
 in the Auckland region (Wellsford to Pukekohe) must close for physical attendance and instruction until 7
 February. This was a request from the Controller at Auckland Emergency Management (not NEMA).
- Stranded passengers at Auckland Airport International terminal NEMA and AEM have been embedded and
 working closely with the airport to manage stranded passengers. Last night, 200 people transiting or delayed
 were fed. 35 people sleeping overnight in the terminal were supported with bedding and welfare checks.
 This coordination was supported by the local New Zealand Response Team, NZRT-3 from Auckland (these
 are volunteers). The plan will be in place until Friday to support any ongoing travellers as well as any impacts
 from further predicted inclement weather.
- Auckland Emergency Management have recorded 493 households requesting assistance; 604 people (157 households) requiring accommodation; 84 people (20 households) supported into accommodation.
- Approx 3000 properties are without water and 600 without electricity.
- Seven Marae have been activated these are providing support with accommodation and food.
- More than 180 Building Inspectors were in the field yesterday, supported by geotechnical engineers, structural engineers and Urban Search and Rescue. While most buildings have experienced minimal to no damage, this is not the case for all. 76 red; 310 yellow and 725 white placards have been issued.
- The number of impacted buildings has not been updated approximately 5000 buildings will require an assessment across 25 suburbs.

- An "Amber" wind warning (based on Auckland Transport's own scale) has been issued for the Auckland Harbour Bridge from 1700 hrs 31/01/2023 until 0600 1/02/2023. If it is upgraded to "Red", there is a potential for the Auckland Harbour Bridge to close.
- A road slip is preventing access to restore power to some residents in the Hunua/Moumoukai area.
- As at 1311 hrs 30/01/23, 65 premises on Kawau Island had their power restored.
- Five Cruise ships are due to dock in Auckland over the coming week, with over 6,800 passengers expected to visit downtown Auckland.
- Bad weather is expected to continue to impact the region, particularly on Tuesday evening. Auckland
 Emergency Management (AEM) are preparing to support additional operations that may be required as a
 result.

Northland

- Two NZDF Unimogs have been deployed to Northland at the request of the Northland Group Manager.
- Northland CDEM continue to monitor the severe weather warning and watch currently in place for Northland.

Waikato (including Coromandel)

- Waitomo District Council lifted their state of local emergency declaration at 9:37am Monday 30 January.
- Waikato CDEM Group Emergency Coordination Centre and five Emergency Operation Centres are activated.
- SH26 Te Aroha to Paeroa is closed due to flooding.
- There is concern that the Waikato River will continue to rise; Waikato CDEM Group has sourced more sandbags as a precaution.
- 19 River sites are above flood warning level.
- Approximately 75 properties without power across the region.

NEMA

- The Caring for Communities CEs group is meeting this morning. This is Chaired by MSD.
- A Watch Group is meeting this afternoon on the severe weather.

The speaking points & public safety messages haven't changed since yesterday:

Public safety messages

- Further severe weather is expected over the next few days. Put safety first. Don't take any chances. Act quickly if you see rising water.
- Please plan your journey if you have to travel and only use roads if it is safe to do so. Never drive through flood waters.
- Don't walk swim, or play in flood water. In addition to the danger of drowning, flood water can contain hidden debris, chemicals, animal waste and human sewage that can make you sick.
- Only return home after Civil Defence and emergency services have told you it is safe to do so. It may not be safe to return home even when the floodwaters have receded.
- Stay away from damaged areas. You might hamper rescue and other emergency operations and be at further risk from the residual effects of floods.
- Help others if you can, especially people who may need extra help.

Cleaning up after a flood

- Clean and dry your house and everything in it. Floodwater can make the air in your home unhealthy. When
 things get wet for more than two days they usually get mouldy. There may also be germs and bugs in your
 home after a flood.
- Mould may make some people with asthma, allergies or other breathing problems sick. Please use personal protective equipment to protect yourself and others from harm.

Evacuation Advice

- If you have to evacuate bring with you any essential items you may need including medication, warm clothing and baby items.
- Take your pets with you when you evacuate if it's not safe for you, it's not safe for them.
- If you have been evacuated, it may not be safe to return home even when the floodwaters have receded. Listen to emergency services and local Civil Defence authorities and don't return home until they tell you it is safe to do so.

This will be an unsettling time for many people. Please look after each other, put safety first, and listen to the advice of civil defence and emergency services.

CURRENT EVENTS

Severe Weather - North Island

The Officials Committee for Domestic and External Security Coordination (ODESC) system has been activated at 1646hrs Monday 30 January in support of lead agency, NEMA, due to the ongoing Severe Weather Event.

Severe Weather Update

Northland currently has a RED heavy rain warning in force from 0300hrs today to 0600hrs tomorrow. The heaviest falls are expected from this afternoon. A severe thunderstorm watch is also in force.

Auckland has a RED heavy rain warning in force north of Orewa from 1600hrs today to 0700hrs tomorrow. An ORANGE heavy rain warning is in force for the rest of Auckland. Heaviest falls are likely to be tonight.

Coromandel Peninsula has a RED heavy rain warning in force from 1900hrs today to 1600hrs tomorrow. Heaviest falls are expected overnight and tomorrow morning.

Bay of Plenty has an ORANGE heavy rain warning in force from 0300hrs tomorrow to 0300hrs Thursday. This warning may need to be extended into later Thursday or Friday.

Northeast wind gusts of 90 km/h are possible in exposed places from Northland to northern Coromandel, which may impact Auckland Harbour Bridge and arterial roads Tuesday afternoon and evening.

From Friday, the weather in the north should ease to isolated showers. Conditions are predicted to continue improving into next week for all affected regions.

Auckland

Unfavourable weather is expected to continue to impact the region, particularly this evening. Auckland Emergency Management (AEM) are preparing to support additional operations that may be required as a result. Iwi liaisons are contacting marae and iwi in the region to assess their situation. Seven maraes have been activated to provide with accommodation and food. AEM's three CDCs and the Community and Agency Information Hub remain open as of Monday 30 January and planning is underway for their ongoing support.

Following a media briefing at 1600hrs Monday 30 January, AEM confirmed in discussion with Auckland Transpot Operations Centre (ATOC) and Ministry of Education (MOE) that all Auckland schools will remain closed until Tuesday 7 February due to impending weather risk and currently compromised roading network and buildings.

As at 1700hrs Monday 30 January 76 red placards and 310 yellow have been issued as part of rapid building inspections. 82 people stayed at Civil Defence Centres (CDCs) overnight on 29 January. 604 people have requested accommodation from AEM.

38 local roads and 17 lanes across the whole motorway network are closed with work continuing to clear and reopen routes. Access is being restored but are difficult to maintain due to ongoing weather and additional slips.

Buses are operating at close to normal timetables. A slip in Parnell may impact train schedules today. Both the Western and Eastern Train lines will be open, however both lines can expect extended journey times or reduced service levels.

A temporary Bailey bridge is expected to be in place today at Mill Flat Road in Riverhead. Limited 4WD access remains for the community via forestry roads.

Vector report a slip on Paturoa Road, Titirangi has restricted access to 32 customers who remain without power.

NEMA has deployed 22 staff to Auckland (a combination of NEMA, Emergency Management Assistance Team and Civil Defence staff). Today we received requests for a further 25 staff.

Northland

Northland CDEM continue to monitor the severe weather warning currently in place for Northland. At 1000hrs Monday 30 January, two rivers had reached warning levels and the gauges at Wairua indicated flooding.

A New Zealand Defence Force Unimog has been deployed to Whangarei in preparation for the incoming weather front. Another Unimog is expected to arrive today at 1300hrs. Three District Councils are on standby to activate contingency plans if required. A NEMA Regional Emergency Management Agent (REMA) has also been deployed to Whangarei.

Waikato

Waitomo District Council lifted their state of local emergency declaration as at 0937hrs Monday 30 January. Waikato CDEM Group Emergency Coordination Centre and five Emergency Operation Centres remain activated.

Approximately 75 properties without power across the region and 28 buildings have been impacted by flooding. There is concern that the Waikato River will continue to rise. Waikato CDEM Group has sourced more sandbags as a precaution.

Bay of Plenty

Approximately 30 properties are isolated in Western Bay of Plenty due to a bridge washout. The Ngongotaha River level has receded but still a concern with forecasted weather. Clean-up is underway but the Bay of Plenty CDEM Group will continue to liaise with MetService and undertake contingency planning for the next weather front which is forecast to impact the region from Wednesday onwards.

Factsheet: Local transition periods

The Civil Defence Emergency Management Act 2002

The Civil Defence Emergency Management Act 2002:

- provides for local transition periods to assist recovery
- provides for certain people to be authorised to give notice of a local transition period; and
- provides powers to Recovery Managers during local transition periods.

Who is authorised to give notice of a local transition period (s25)?

A Mayor can give notice of a local transition period for the territorial district. If the Mayor is absent, and elected member of a territorial authority may give notice of a local transition period.

The CDEM Group must also appoint at least one person (a representative of the Group) to give notice of local transition periods for the Group's area. This appointment of persons authorised to give notice of a local transition period mirrors the state of local emergency requirements.

If the Group appoints more than one person to give notice, they must state whether they have equal status to give notice, or whether they are only authorised in the absence of another named person. They must also include any conditions or limitations to the appointment (s25(3)).

The Minister can also give notice of a local transition period if it appears to the Minister that a local transition period is required (\$948(3)).

A notice of local transition period must be given on Form 17 of Schedule 2 in the Civil Defence Emergency Management Regulations 2003, or a form of similar effect.

What area does a local transition period apply over?

A local transition period can apply to one or more districts or wards within an area (s94B(1)). A local transition period notice can be given over the whole area of a CDEM Group or a district within an area of a CDEM Group.

When can a notice of local transition period be given?

A person who is authorised can give notice of a local transition period:

- Following a declaration of local state of emergency;
- · Following approval from the Minister when:
 - a period of recovery is required after an emergency, when there was no local state of emergency declared (s94B(2));
 - where the local transition period is required for COVID-19 reasons (s94B(12)); or
- For a district or ward not affected by an emergency if the resources of that area could assist an area affected by the emergency (s94B(9)). Although this is not necessary if these areas are willing to provide their resources (i.e. they don't need access to the special transition period powers).

If approval from the Minister is needed, this should be obtained by the person authorised by writing to the Minister (email is sufficient) and should be discussed with a NEMA Regional Emergency Management Advisor beforehand.

The fact that an emergency has occurred does not mean there is a need or obligation to give notice of a local transition period.

What needs to be considered when deciding whether to give notice of local transition period?

A notice of local transition period must not be given unless the person authorised to give notice is satisfied that the following legal tests are met:

- It must appear to the person giving the notice that a local transition period is required (94B(1));
- Invoking the powers to manage, coordinate, or direct recovery activities is:
 - In the public interest; and
 - Necessary or desirable to ensure a timely and effective recovery (s94B(4)).

The person authorised must also have regard to the areas, districts, or wards affected by the emergency and whether the focus is moving from response to recovery, including if the state of emergency is about to expire or be terminated (s94B(5)).

The powers exercised during a state of local emergency do not automatically transfer to a local transition period. A new assessment applying the legal tests for use of local transition period powers is required. Some powers available under a state of emergency are not available under a local transition period e.g. ability to requisition under s90.

Who needs to be involved in the decision?

The authorised person should discuss giving notice of a local transition period with the Group Controller/ Controller, Group Recovery Manager/Recovery Manager and they should also discuss it with their NEMA Regional Emergency Management Advisor, who can help ensure national CDEM level awareness of the emergency and raise any requests for national level support.

To make an informed decision, the authorised person should also consult with other people as appropriate, including:

- Local authority departments involved in response and recovery e.g. building control, asset management;
- Fire and Emergency New Zealand;
- Providers of health and disability services e.g.
 District Health Board, Primary Health Organisations,
 Ambulance Services.

What needs to be considered about the area affected?

The person appointed by the CDEM Group can give notice for the area of the CDEM Group concerned, or for one or more districts or wards within the area (\$94B(1)).

Generally, as local transition periods provide for powers that are not normally available and there are tests to ensure that invoking the powers is necessary or desirable, notices should be limited to the areas(s) affected. For example, notice of a local transition period does not need to be given for the entire area of the Group if the emergency only affects one or two districts or wards.

Local transition periods for a lesser geographical area (e.g. ward) cease to have effect when a local transition period for a larger geographical area is given (s94B(8)).

If the same emergency affects more than one CDEM Group, affected CDEM Groups (and/or Mayors) coordinate but each give their own respective transition notices.

What if the Minister gives notice of a national transition period?

If the Minister gives notice of a national transition period, any other local transition period in force in the area or district ceases to have effect (s94A(4)(b)). Except if the national transition period relates to COVID-19 reasons.

Likewise, notice of a local transition period cannot be given for any part of New Zealand while a national transition period is in force for that part (s94B(11)). Except if the national transition period relates to COVID-19 reasons as set out below.

What if a local transition period is needed during local government elections?

Only elected representatives of the members of the Group are able to give notice of local transition period (s25). Following a local election there may be no-one available to give notice as members cannot act as an elected representative until they are sworn in (clause 14, Schedule 7 of the Local Government Act 2002).

If an emergency arises following a local election but before members are sworn in and emergency powers are needed, a local transition period can be declared by:

- The Minister for Emergency Management giving notice of a local transition period for a CDEM Group area or any district or ward within that area (s94B(3)); or
- In circumstances that provide a period of warning, such as an impending adverse weather event, a council meeting may be called as soon as practicable to have the new council sworn in (clause 21(3), Schedule 7, Local Government Act 2002), allowing he Mayor to give notice of a local transition period under s25(5) of the CDEM Act 2002.

How do you change from state of emergency to local transition period?

Where a state of emergency was declared, a local transition period comes into force (s94C(1)) either:

- On the termination of a state of emergency; or
- On the expiry of the state of emergency if the local transition period notice states this.

If notice of local transition period is given before the state of emergency is due to expire, the state of emergency must be terminated.

If no state of emergency is currently in force, the transition period comes into force at the time and date given on the transition notice (s94C(2)).

If the Minister gives notice of a local transition period, the declared state of local emergency is automatically terminated (s72(3)).

How long does a local transition period last?

A local transition period ends 28 days after the time and date that it comes into force, unless extended or terminated earlier.

This means that if a local transition period comes into force at 0935 on 1 January, it would expire at 0935 on 29 January.

How is the duration of a local transition period extended?

Before a local transition period ends, the duration of the period can be extended either by:

- The person who gave the notice; or
- Another person authorised to give notice (s94D(2)).

Before extending, the authorised person must be satisfied that:

- It appears to the person giving the notice that the extension is required (s94D(2)); and
- They have regard to the areas, districts or wards affected by the emergency (s94D(3)(a)); and
- That invoking the powers to manage, coordinate, or direct recovery activities is:
 - In the public interest; and
 - Necessary or desirable to ensure a timelyand effective recovery (s94D(3)(b)).

A local transition period can be extended more than once (s94D(7)).

An extension of a local transition period only relates to the duration of the period, not the area. This means, an extension of local transition period can be given for the same geographical area as the original notice, or a reduced geographical area. For example, Districts A, B and C are subject to a local transition period. It is proposed to extend the duration of the local transition period for districts A and C, but not B. A notice of extension of duration can be given for districts A and C, leaving district B to expire (or be terminated).

However, if it is proposed that the area subject to a local transition period be increased in size geographically, then a new local transition period should be given.

A notice of extension of local transition period must be given on Form 18 of Schedule 2 in the Civil Defence Emergency Management Regulations 2003, or a form of similar effect.

What if the local transition period is extended three or more times?

The person who extends the period (other than the Minister) must give the Minister a copy of the notice at the same time as notifying the public of the extension (\$94D(9)(a)).

This can be done by sending a short-signed letter to the Minister (and Minister's office) with the notice attached.

Once the Minister receives the notice of extension, the Minister must advise the House of Representatives as soon as practicable (s94D(9)(b)).

What if the local transition notice needs to be terminated?

The person who gave the notice, or another authorised person, may terminate the local transition period by notice (s94E(2)).

A notice of termination of local transition period must be given on Form 19 of Schedule 2 in the Civil Defence Emergency Management Regulations 2003, or a form of similar effect. The local transition period is terminated at the date and time specified on the form (s94E(3)).

If a state of emergency is declared when a local transition period is in force in the area, it automatically overrides the local transition period, and a termination of a transition period notice does not need to be given (s94E(7)).

What are the requirements to publish a notice of local transition period?

A person who gives notice or extends the duration of a local transition period must as soon as practicable notify the public of the notice by publishing the notice:

- In one or more newspapers circulating in the areas, districts, or wards to which the notice relates; and
- On an internet site to which the public has free access (s94F(4)(a)).

They must also ensure that the notice or extension is published in the Gazette as soon as practicable (s94F(4) (b)).

A person who terminates a local transition period must immediately notify the public by any means of communication that are reasonably practicable in the circumstances, and ensure that the notice of termination is published in the Gazette as soon as practicable (s94E(6)).

COVID-19 related transition periods

Ministerial approval is required to give notice of a local transition period for COVID-19 related reasons

The CDEM Act 2002 has been amended to require approval from the Minister for Emergency Management before notice of a local transition period can be given for COVID-19 related reasons (s94B(12)). This provides the opportunity to test if the transition period is necessary or desirable and to ensure that a nationally consistent approach continues to be taken to COVID-19.

Allowing a local transition period for a non-COVID-19 related emergency when a national transition period is in place for COVID-19


Normally, the CDEM Act 2002 does not allow a national and local transition period to be in place at the same

time for the same area (or part area). The CDEM Act 2002 has been amended to allow notice of a local Released under the Official Information Act 1982 transition period to be given for a non-COVID-19 related emergency when a national transition period




Process for giving notice of a local transition period (s94B)*

Quick Guide: Giving notice of a local transition period

Purpose of transition periods

A local transition period helps support the transition from response to initial recovery phase by providing extraordinary powers. It also allows for the Recovery Manager to direct and coordinate the use of personnel, material and other resources for the purpose of carrying out recovery activities.

A transition notice should only exist if it is necessary or desirable to carry out vital and immediate recovery activities that could not otherwise be achieved urgently during the transition phase using business as usual powers.

Key tests

- Does it appear to you that a local transition period is required within one or more districts or wards?
 Things that might help you determine this are:
 - Are transition powers provided by the CDEM Act 2002 required or likely to be required?
 - Is there a need to retain the measures undertaken under the state of emergency e.g. evacuations from property for the preservation of human life, powers to inspect buildings etc?
- 2. Is invoking the powers to manage, coordinate, or direct recovery activities-
 - · In the public interest; and
 - Necessary or desirable to ensure a timely and effective recovery?

In deciding whether a local transition period is required you must have regard to-

- The areas, districts, or wards affected by the emergency; and
- Whether the focus of activities in any area, district or ward is moving from response to recovery
- 3. Is a state of emergency about to expire or be terminated?
 - If no state of emergency was declared or the state of emergency is required to respond to COVID-19 matters, you will need to seek the approval of the Minister for Emergency Management.
- Is the local transition period related to COVID-19? If so, you will need to seek the approval of the Minister for Emergency Management.
- 5. Is a statutory Recovery Manager role holder (appointed under the CDEM Act) available to exercise the powers?
- 6. Is a handover planned between the Controller and Recovery Manager? This will ensure that the appropriate knowledge and information is transferred.

Other considerations

To assist in considering all aspects of public interest, have you talked with:

- Group Controller/Local Controller, Group Recovery Manager/Local Recovery Manager, Emergency Management Officer?
- NEMA Regional Emergency Management Advisor?
- Local Authority departments involved in response and recovery, e.g. building control, asset management?
- Fire and Emergency New Zealand?
- Providers of health and disability services (e.g. District Health Boards, Primary Health Organisations, Ambulance Services)?

Other considerations(continued)



Important: A state of emergency must be terminated or expire before a local transition period can be notified for that emergency event. Measures taken using powers under a state of emergency (for example restricting access to unsafe buildings) do not automatically continue under a local transition period.

Being in a state of emergency does not automatically mean that a local transition period is required. A new assessment of what powers may be needed (e.g. placarding, evacuation, closing of roads etc) needs to be made before giving notice of a local transition period. Not all powers available during a state of emergency are available during a transition period e.g. no power of requisitioning (s90), no ability to remove aircraft, vessels, vehicles (s89).

When the state of emergency ends you will need to reassess the need for the measures in place and, if they are still needed, new powers under the transition period will need to be exercised, applying the relevant statutory tests for transition powers.

Ministerial approval is required to give notice of a local transition period for COVID-19 related reasons

The CDEM Act has been amended to require approval from the Minister for Emergency Management before notice of a local transition period can be given for COVID-19 related reasons (s94B(12)). This provides the opportunity to test if the transition period is necessary or desirable and to ensure that a nationally consistent approach continues to be taken to COVID-19.

Allowing a local transition period for a non-COVID-19 related emergency when a national transition period for COVID-19 is in place

Normally, the CDEM Act does not allow a national and local transition period to be in place at the same time for the same area (or part area). The CDEM Act has been amended to allow notice of a local transition period to be given for a non-COVID-19 related emergency when a national transition period for COVID-19 is in place for the same area (or part area) (s94B(13)).

On 30 January 2023, Auckland Council issued a region wide Designation in light of the flooding event.

The Designation was executed by the Mayor of Auckland pursuant to the Building Act 2004 and the Civil Defence and Emergency Management Act 2002.

Now that the Designation is in place, the Building Act provides a number of special powers that may be exercised in respect of all buildings within the designated area. These powers are able to be exercised by a responsible person.

The responsible person may now determine that any equivalent notice/placard that was issued in relation to a building under the CDEM Act notice must be treated as continuing in force under the relevant provision in the Building Act.

The designation will be notified by Auckland Council on their website today.

Kia ora koutou,

This is a copy of the update provided through the PM Urgent Update Signal Chat (it was sent in three parts: weather; speaking points; update).

Key points – at 1pm, Northland Civil Defence Emergency Management Group declared a state of local emergency for the region. This is not yet public.

Kia ora PM and Minister (sent midday)

The weather update is below. I will send the rest of the update through shortly as we have just received updated numbers from Auckland Emergency Management.

MetService Weather Update at 1100hrs 31 January

Today - Tuesday 31 Jan:

Upper North Island:

- Steady rain moving into parts of Northland and Auckland, heavier from the afternoon with a risk of thunderstorms/downpours.
- RED heavy rain warnings in force for Northland (to 4am Wed, heaviest falls from afternoon) and Auckland north of Orewa (5pm Tue - 8am Wed, heaviest falls overnight). Thunderstorm Watch in force for Northland (noon Tue - 4am Wed).
- Strong north to northeast winds for both Northland and Auckland, especially from afternoon Wind Watch in force. Gusts reaching 80km/h about the Harbour Bridge from 2pm today, remaining gusty into evening/overnight (lower risk of 90km/h gusts).

- Rain spreads south to reach Coromandel Peninsular this evening, with heaviest falls overnight / Wednesday morning. RED heavy rain warning in force (10pm Tue 3pm Wed).
- Orange Heavy Rain Warnings for remainder of Auckland, Bay of Plenty, far north of Gisborne.

Elsewhere:

- Heavy Rain Watches in force for Waikato, Mt. Taranaki, northwest Tasman, Westland south of Otira.
- Scattered heavy showers expected from afternoon in the South Island, with a moderate risk of Severe
 Thunderstorms for South Canterbury, Central Otago, Clutha and Southland Severe Thunderstorm Watch in
 force from 2pm 9pm.

Tomorrow – Wednesday 1 Feb, and Outlook:

- Rain eases overnight in Northland, Wednesday morning in Auckland and Wednesday afternoon in Coromandel Peninsula.
- Showers may continue throughout the remainder of Wednesday in Coromandel Peninsula.
- Periods of rain continue in Bay of Plenty throughout Wednesday and into Thursday.
- Periods of rain in Westland likely to need an Orange Warning for Thursday onwards but NOT an exceptional event for Westland.

Northland

- NEMA is closely monitoring the situation in Northland as significant rainfall is expected. Three NEMA staff
 have deployed to the Emergency Coordination Centre. We are expecting a request for additional staffing
 support.
- No thland CDEM declared a state of local emergency at 1300hrs.
- Northland CDEM Group Emergency Coordination Centre (ECC) activated at 0800hrs this morning (31
 January). The Far North District
- Kaitāia is expected to be significantly impacted and planning for evacuations is underway.
- A FENZ Urban Search and Rescue Team (USAR) arrived in Whangārei yesterday (30 January).

- 164 Rapid Damage Assessments have been conducted.
- Top Energy and Northpower report no major faults.

Auckland

- The upcoming severe weather is expected to put further pressure on communities and response operations
- Last night, 92 people stayed in a Civil Defence Centre. (36 people in Kelston CDC; 22 in Massey University CDC; 32 in the Randwick Park CDC; and 2 in the Mangere Memorial Hall Information Centre.
- The M\u00e4ngere Information Hub has moved location to the Moana Nui a Kiwa Pool and Leisure Centre 66R Mascot Avenue, M\u00e4ngere.
- At 1100hrs, 493 households are requesting assistance; 604 people (157 households) require
 accommodation; 111 people have been supported into accommodation. Auckland Emergency Management
 is working to clear a backlog of welfare requests.
- MBIE is sending additional building inspectors to assist. Building assessments are expected to be concluded this week – 200 building inspectors, geotechnical engineers and structural engineers are undertaking inspection today. (Currently 91 red placards; 336 yellow placards; 785 white placards).
- Approximately 3000 properties remain without water and 650 without electricity. There are various phone service outages.
- Arrangements are in place to support any travellers stranded at Auckland Airport's international terminal; from 6pm they will be fed and from 11pm provided with bedding.
- The toll on the Auckland Northern Gateway Toll Road on SH1 has been removed until the end of the Auckland state of emergency.
- The resilience of both SH1 and SH16 is very low, this increases the likelihood of there being no viable route available between Brynderwyn and Puhoi if further damage occurs.
- Five Cruise ships are due to dock in Auckland over the coming week, with over 6,800 passengers expected to visit downtown Auckland.

<u>Waikato</u>

- Waikato CDEM Group ECC and four Emergency Operation Centres are activated.
- 20 River sites are above flood warning level.
- Approximately 52 properties are without power across the region.
- SH25a will be closed for an extended period due to a significant under slip. Crews are developing a plan for its long-term closure.
- SH23 to Raglan is cracking and moving with a slow slip. This is being closely monitored.

Public safety messages

- Further severe weather is expected over the next few days. Put safety first. Don't take any chances. Act quickly if you see rising water.
- Please plan your journey if you have to travel and only use roads if it is safe to do so. Never drive through flood waters.
- Don't walk, swim, or play in flood water. In addition to the danger of drowning, flood water can contain hidden debris, chemicals, animal waste and human sewage that can make you sick.
- Only return home after Civil Defence and emergency services have told you it is safe to do so. It
 may not be safe to return home even when the floodwaters have receded.
- Stay away from damaged areas You might hamper rescue and other emergency operations and be at further risk from the residual effects of floods.
- Help others if you can, especially people who may need extra help.

Cleaning up after a lood

- Clean and dry your house and everything in it. Floodwater can make the air in your home unhealthy. When things get wet for more than two days they usually get mouldy. There may also be germs and bugs in your home after a flood.
- Mould may make some people with asthma, allergies or other breathing problems sick. Please use personal protective equipment to protect yourself and others from harm.

- If you have to evacuate bring with you any essential items you may need including medication, warm clothing and baby items.
- Take your pets with you when you evacuate if it's not safe for you, it's not safe for them.
- If you have been evacuated, it may not be safe to return home even when the floodwaters have receded. Listen to emergency services and local Civil Defence authorities and don't return home until they tell you it is safe to do so.
- This will be an unsettling time for many people. Please look after each other, put safety first, and listen to the advice of civil defence and emergency services. nformal



This is a copy of the update provided through the PM Urgent Update Signal Group Chat. Attached is a picture of the current red and orange weather warnings for the upper North Island.

Kia Ora PM and Minister, this is \$ 9(2)(g)(ii), [NEMA] from NEMA and I've taken over the updates from Sarah for tonight.

Below is the 1615hr update:

Severe Weather Outlook

Today - Tuesday 31 Jan:

Upper North Island:

- Bursts of heavy rain and thunderstorms are spreading onto Northland this afternoon, heavy rain spreading south through northern Auckland and Coromandel Peninsular by tonight, and western Bay of Plenty overnight - these areas are the focus of our RED WARNINGS due to a risk of enhanced impacts in already affected regions.
- Strong east to northeast winds also for Northland and Auckland this afternoon to overnight, with large waves on eastern coasts. Wind gusts generally reaching 80 – 90 km/h (including the Harbour Bridge).

Orange Heavy Rain Warnings for remainder of Auckland, Bay of Plenty, far north of Gisborne.

Elsewhere:

- Heavy Rain Watches in force for Waikato, Mt. Taranaki, northwest Tasman, Westland south of Otira.
- Scattered heavy showers this afternoon/evening for inland South Island, with a moderate risk of Severe Thunderstorms for South Canterbury, Central Otago, Clutha and Southland.

<u>Tomorrow – Wednesday 1 Feb:</u>

- Heavy rain (with thunderstorm risk) eases overnight in **Northland**, Wednesday morning in **Auckland**, and Wednesday afternoon in **Coromandel Peninsular** (followed by showers in Coromandel).
- Focus of heavy rain by late Wednesday will be Bay of Plenty and far north of Gisborne.
- Risk of severe thunderstorms in Clutha and Southland afternoon/evening.

Outlook:

- Rain continues in Bay of Plenty and northern Gisborne into Thursday.
- Heavy rain in Westland/northern Fiordland for Thursday/Friday Orange warning expected (more heavy rain on Sunday) but <u>NOT</u> an exceptional event there.
- Risk of heavy showers/rain over northern NZ on Friday (flagged in Severe Weather Outlook) but considerable uncertainty.
- Drier and more settled over northern NZ into Waitangi Weekend (some showers may linger).

Northland

- Northland declared a state of local emergency for the Northland CDEM Group area at 1300hrs today (31 January).
- Northland have issued an Emergency Mobile Alert (EMA) to notify to the public of the state of local emergency declaration and severe weather
- One River in the Ruakākā region is above flood warning level.
- Northland CDEM Group Emergency Coordination Centre (ECC) activated at 0800hrs this morning (31
 January), and all three Emergency Operation Centres (EOC) have been stood up. Three NEMA staff have
 deployed to the ECC.
- Kaitāia is expected to be significantly impacted and planning for evacuations is underway.
- Community Response Teams are on standby and FENZ have deployed their Swift Water Team to Kaitāia.
- A FENZ Urban Search and Rescue Team (USAR) arrived in Whangarei yesterday (30 January).
- 164 Rapid Damage Assessments have been conducted. No update received.
- **▼ To**p Energy and Northpower report no major faults. No update received.

Auckland

- Auckland Emergency Management issued an EMA at 3.30pm today advising necessary travel only, information on self-evacuation and where to go for help/info.
- Auckland City Council Chief Executive is convening a meeting at 5.30pm today with Chief Executives /Chairs of central government agencies, Auckland agencies, and Auckland services to discuss the event in Auckland.

- Contamination of floodwaters is a risk to the response operations. The CDEM Group have contacted Auckland Council Healthy Waters for assistance and advice.
- Watercare are working to resolve water supply issues in West Auckland. Water tankers are providing emergency water to impacted areas.
- The Watercare treatment plant at Pukekohe remains offline.
- Power has been restored to parts of Kawau Island, it will require helicopter access to restore the rest of the island, this is expected in the next few days.
- Health and Safety Officers continue to visit each Civil Defence Centre daily to assist with any Health and Safety issues and advice.
- At 1100hrs, 493 households are requesting assistance; 604 people (157 households) require
 accommodation; 111 people have been supported into accommodation. Auckland Emergency Management
 is working to clear a backlog of welfare requests.
- Building assessments are expected to be concluded this week 200 building inspectors, geotechnical
 engineers and structural engineers are undertaking inspection today. (Latest but not updated figures are 91
 red placards; 336 yellow placards; 785 white placards).
- Approximately 3000 properties remain without water and 650 without electricity. There are various phone service outages. No update received.
- Auckland ECC Operations continue to monitor the situation at Auckland Airport.
- Arrangements are in place to support any travellers stranded at Auckland Airport's international terminal;
 from 6pm they will be fed and from 11pm provided with bedding.

Waikato (including Coromandel)

- Waitomo District Council lifted their state of local emergency declaration at 9:37am Monday 30 January.
- Waikato CDEM Group ECC and four Emergency Operation Centres are activated.
- Powerco reports power outages in the Paeroa area are impacting 592 properties, and in Morrinsville power outages affect 12 properties. Powerco is working to restore these by late this evening.
- There is concern that the Waikato River will continue to rise, Waikato CDEM Group has sourced more sandbags as a precaution.
 - 20 River sites are above flood warning level.
- SH25a will be closed for an extended period due to the significant under slip. Crews are developing a plan for its long-term closure.
- SH23 to Raglan is cracking and moving with a slow slip. This is being closely monitored.

Bay of Plenty

- The Tauranga Hospital has leaks occurring, particularly in the Emergency Department. Further rain may impact the building.
- Areas of concern include the Ngongotaha River, Rotorua, and the Maungatapu slip.



Public safety messages

Further severe weather is expected over the next few days. Put safety first. Don't take any chances. Act quickly if you see rising water.

- Please plan your journey if you have to travel and only use roads if it is safe to do so. Never drive through flood waters.
- Don't walk, swim, or play in flood water. In addition to the danger of drowning, flood water can contain hidden debris, chemicals, animal waste and human sewage that can make you sick.
- Only return home after Civil Defence and emergency services have told you it is safe to do so. It may not be safe to return home even when the floodwaters have receded.
- Stay away from damaged areas. You might hamper rescue and other emergency operations and be at further risk from the residual effects of floods.
- Help others if you can, especially people who may need extra help.

Cleaning up after a flood

- Clean and dry your house and everything in it. Floodwater can make the air in your home unhealthy. When
 things get wet for more than two days they usually get mouldy. There may also be germs and bugs in your
 home after a flood.
- Mould may make some people with asthma, allergies or other breathing problems sick. Please use personal
 protective equipment to protect yourself and others from harm.

Evacuation Advice

- If you have to evacuate bring with you any essential items you may need including medication, warm clothing and baby items.
- Take your pets with you when you evacuate if it's not safe for you, it's not safe for them.
- If you have been evacuated, it may not be safe to return home even when the floodwaters have receded.
 Listen to emergency services and local Civil Defence authorities and don't return home until they tell you it is safe to do so.
- This will be an unsettling time for many people. Please look after each other, put safety first, and listen to the advice of civil defence and emergency services.





Appendix 2 - Biographies and Photos


Auckland Emergency Management (AEM) sits within his portfolio.
