Official Information Act request about risk calculations for innovation in clinical research

Thank you for your Official Information Act 1982 (OIA) request, which was transferred from the Prime Minister's Office to the Department of the Prime Minister and Cabinet (DPMC), and the Ministry of Health (MOH) on 8 March 2023.

You have requested:

"I attach relavent answers from director general of health.

The question posed to the pm is different

Let me rephase it

Does government have a value at risk calculation for its assumption of risk allowing the population to innovate?

I also note that all the answers i have recieved to date clearly spell out a lack of any formal cost benefit analysis for the major pieces of health legislation introduced and enacted in the last decade.

I think its safe to assume that all the major health reforms are not underpinned by any formal analysis on their impact on patients."

While DPMC is not the responsible agency for health, and health-related legislation, I can advise that the Health and Disability Review Transition Unit (HTU) at DPMC led the response to the Health and Disability System Review from September 2020 until its disestablishment in September 2022. This included developing the policy response and design of the system operating model, providing advice on the establishment of new entities and legislative change, and producing an overall implementation plan and work programme for the transition.

For the purposes of your request, DPMC is providing a response insofar as the documents within the scope of your request are held by DPMC. I can advise that DPMC will only be able to provide documents from September 2020 to September 2022 related to the work for which it was responsible.

I believe MOH will be able to provide you with a response with regards to other health-related legislation that has been enacted in the last decade as the responsible agency for health in New Zealand.

For clarity, DPMC has taken "value at risk calculation" and "formal cost benefit analysis" to refer to an impact analysis. From a DPMC perspective, I can confirm that proposals put

forward by the HTU have included a full impact analysis. I further advise that the relevant HTU papers have been proactively released on the DPMC website.
