Official Information Act for correspondence regarding OIA requests involving Rt Hon Christ Hipkins from May to June 2022

Thank you for your follow-up Official Information Act 1982 (the Act) request received on 19 May 2023. You requested:

"Copies of correspondence to or from DPMC and/or the Prime Ministers Office (PMO), regarding OIA requests involving Minister Chris Hipkins, for the period between May 2022 and June 2022. In particular, instances where Minister Hipkins (or staff) has consulted the PMO regarding OIA requests involving his departments."

On 19 June 2023, we wrote to you extending the time limit for response by 22 working days, to 20 July 2023. The additional time was sought because your request necessitated a search through a large quantity of information, and to complete consultations before a final decision could be made on your request.

I would like to provide you some context to assist you to understand our response. The Department of the Prime Minister and Cabinet (DPMC) provides administrative assistance to several Ministers across a range of portfolio matters. DPMC may also respond to OIAs received directly, which include matters of interest for the Ministers, and therefore involve some communication with the offices. Where we support Ministers, we refer to these requests internally as Ministerial Official Information Act requests (MOIAs). Departmental Information Act requests are referred to as DOIAs.

During May and June 2022, DPMC responded to 10 MOIA requests in the COVID-19 Response portfolio. In addition, DPMC responded to 103 DOIAs during this time. Of which, we believe there were 33 DOIAs, which likely included engagement with PMO and/or Minister Hipkins' office.

I have enclosed all relevant documentation relating to eight of the MOIAs identified as being in scope of your request. The other two MOIAs were found not to contain correspondence relevant to your request. Some information is withheld under section 9(2)(a) to protect the privacy of individuals, and under section 9(2)(g)(i) to protect the free and frank expression of opinion between officials. Where information is withheld, I have considered the public interest and determine this does not outweigh the protected interests. Where correspondence included draft responses, I have included the final, signed response and withheld the draft under section 9(2)(g)(i).

I regret that following collation of the material for the MOIAs, we have determined that the effort involved to collate the relevant information for the DOIAs would amount to substantial collation which would amount to an administrative burden. We do not believe imposing a

charge would assist us. After careful consideration, we have determined not to consult you prior to making this decision. As we have already collated the material for the MOIA responses, and we are providing this, we do not believe consulting you would assist in this instance as we are providing as much as reasonable at this time.

The steps involved in collating the material are: accessing each DOIA record in our workflow system, opening the document where actions are recorded, then opening all emails saved into that document, and reviewing each chain to identify those involving interaction with Minister Hipkins or PMO. Following those steps, all relevant emails would need to be saved and converted to PDF format, to be combined into one document, which we could then assess for release. In the circumstances, your request, in so far as it relates to DOIAs where we may have consulted, is declined under section 18(f) – the information cannot be made available without substantial collation.

We have collated the information within scope in respect of the eight Ministerial OIAs referenced earlier.

You have the right to ask the Ombudsman to investigate and review my decision under section 28(3) of the Act.

This response will be published on the Department of the Prime Minister and Cabinet's website during our regular publication cycle. Typically, information this released monthly, or as otherwise determined. Your personal information including name and contact details will be removed for publication.

Official Information Act request for documents relating to proof of vaccination for non-New Zealand citizens

Thank you for your Official Information Act 1982 (the Act) request, transferred to this office on 12 April 2022. You requested:

- " Just a follow up on this as per Government policy
- non-New Zealand citizens including New Zealand permanent residents need proof of vaccination to enter NZ
- non-New Zealand citizens who are transiting New Zealand require proof of vaccination
- foreign air crew arriving in New Zealand require proof of vaccination

Proof of vaccination is not required for refugees or people entering from Ukraine amongst other groups - can you please provide all documentation collaborating with The Ministry of Health relating to the following

- Documents, reporting, risk assessments and recommendations as to why the above groups are required to have proof of vaccination is it a perceived higher risk? Please provide the public health recommendation for this group of people requiring vaccination
- Documents, reporting, risk assessments and recommendations as to why refugees and people from Ukraine ARE NOT required to have proof of vaccination
- is it a perceived lower risk? Please provide the public health recommendation for this group of people and why the don't require vaccination.

If the above has not been done then why not? Surely refugees and people from Ukraine would then fall under the category of non-New Zealand citizens entering in New Zealand who require vaccination."

As you will be aware, since 1 November 2021, vaccination requirements have been in place for non-New Zealand citizens entering New Zealand by air. Unlike other travellers, New Zealand citizens have a right to enter New Zealand under the New Zealand Bill of Rights Act 1990. That right does not extend to Permanent Residents of New Zealand.

Vaccination has played a key role in our COVID-19 response. Vaccination helps protect travellers against severe illness (or death). Vaccination requirements also help to reduce the pressure on our health system. In keeping with the Government's longstanding

approach to the COVID-19 response, border settings, including vaccination requirements, are kept under constant review and informed by public health advice.

On Tuesday 3 May 2022, I announced that the Government is broadening the ability for residence class visa holders to re-enter New Zealand by allowing these visa holders who are not vaccinated against COVID-19 entry to New Zealand from 6 May 2022.

This broadened criteria for return is being enabled initially by the Director-General of Health signing a class exemption which allows unvaccinated travellers holding either a Permanent Resident Visa or a Resident Visa, and Australian citizens ordinarily resident in New Zealand, to enter the country. This class exemption will not prevent people in other groups from continuing to apply for exemptions based on their individual circumstances.

Currently, travellers entering New Zealand by air must have proof of vaccination unless they:

- are a New Zealand citizen
- have a New Zealand residence class visa
- are an Australian citizen ordinarily resident in New Zealand
- are a child aged 16 years and under
- cannot be vaccinated for medical reasons —electronic or paper evidence from a health practitioner is required
- are a refugee arriving in New Zealand for the first time
- are a citizen of Afghanistan and they are being evacuated
- are arriving from Antarctica
- have been granted a visa under the 2022 Special Ukraine Visa Policy; or if they are or were ordinarily resident in Ukraine at any point on or after 1 January 2022.

With regard to your request for certain documents, the following three documents have been identified as being within scope of this part of your request. These documents will be published shortly on the Unite Against COVID-19 website:

This part of your request is therefore refused under section 18(d) of the Act as the information requested is soon to be publicly available.

I am advised that the Department of the Prime Minister and Cabinet (DPMC) does not undertake risk assessments or provide public health recommendations regarding the requirement for non-New Zealand citizens to be vaccinated before being able to enter New Zealand. Public health advice on this issue is provided by the Ministry of Health and I understand you have sent this same request to the Ministry.

Additionally, I am advised that DPMC does not undertake risk assessments or provide public health recommendations which outline or ascertain the risk of those granted a 2022 Special Ukraine visa or refugees who are unvaccinated against COVID-19.

New Zealand's resettlement of quota refugees reflects the Government's commitments and contribution to global humanitarian crises. Quota refugees have been granted exemptions from vaccination requirements on humanitarian grounds due to their specific circumstances such as not having access to vaccines approved by the New Zealand Government and the urgency in which they had to travel to New Zealand.

I am advised that my colleague, Minister Faafoi in his response to your initial request dated 17 March 2022 confirmed details of the 2022 Special Ukraine visa category are contained within a Cabinet paper which is soon to be proactively released by the Ministry of Business, Innovation and Employment. This part of your request therefore is also refused under section 18(d) of the Act, as the information requested will soon be publicly available.

You have the right to ask the Ombudsman to investigate and review my decision under section 28(3) of the Act.

"the release of the legal order made around the decision to restrict permanent residents from reentering NZ who are and not vaccinated."

Following acknowledgement of your initial request, you clarified your request to ask specifically for:

Official Information Act request regarding entry requirements for unvaccinated permanent residents entering New Zealand

Thank you for your Official Information Act 1982 (the Act) request, received on 21 April 2022. You have requested:

"the release of the legal order made around the decision to restrict permanent residents from reentering NZ who are and not vaccinated."

Following acknowledgement of your initial request, you clarified your request to ask specifically for:

"(...) the legal details on why discrimination is being applied to allow NZ Citizens whom are not vaccinated to freely travel but why NZ Residents who have been in this country for over 40 years and paying taxes are being discriminated against simply because of their citizenship status (...)"

As you will be aware, since 1 November 2021, vaccination requirements have been in place for non-New Zealand citizens entering New Zealand by air.

The legal order which outlines this requirement is the COVID-19 Public Health Response (Air Border) 2021 which is publicly available on the New Zealand legislation website: https://www.legislation.govt.nz/regulation/public/2021/0427/latest/LMS577674.html

Unlike other travellers, New Zealand citizens have a right to enter New Zealand under the New Zealand Bill of Rights Act 1990. That right does not extend to Permanent Residents of New Zealand.

Vaccination has played a key role in our COVID-19 response. Vaccination helps protect travellers against severe illness (or death). Vaccination requirements also help to reduce the pressure on our health system. In keeping with the Government's longstanding approach to the COVID-19 response, border settings, including vaccination requirements, are kept under constant review and informed by public health advice.

On Tuesday 3 May 2022, I announced that the Government is broadening the ability for residence class visa holders to re-enter New Zealand by allowing these visa holders who are not vaccinated against COVID-19 entry to New Zealand from 6 May 2022.

This broadened criteria for return is being enabled initially by the Director-General of Health signing a class exemption which allows unvaccinated travellers holding either a Permanent Resident Visa or a Resident Visa, and Australian citizens ordinarily resident in New Zealand, to enter the country.

This class exemption will not prevent people in other groups from continuing to apply for exemptions based on their individual circumstances.

Currently, travellers entering New Zealand by air must have proof of vaccination unless they:

- are a New Zealand citizen
- have a New Zealand residence class visa
- are an Australian citizen ordinarily resident in New Zealand
- are a child aged 16 years and under
- cannot be vaccinated for medical reasons —electronic or paper evidence from a health practitioner is required
- are a refugee arriving in New Zealand for the first time
- · are a citizen of Afghanistan and they are being evacuated
- · are arriving from Antarctica
- have been granted a visa under the 2022 Special Ukraine Visa Policy; or if they
 are or were ordinarily resident in Ukraine at any point on or after 1 January 2022.



Thank you for your Official Information Act 1982 (the Act) request to Hon Chris Hipkins, which was received on 8 May 2022. Your request was:

"As it is now clear that the rest of the world has, or is in a state of repeal of the Covid emergency powers (and New Zealand has "caught up" with the level of infection and endemicity is being discussed) what criteria remain here that require the citizens of this country to have not have the same repeal process made by 30 June 2022 (as communicated previously) and why it should be held back until the end date set in May 2023."

The time frames for responding to your request were extended under section 15A of the Act by 10 working days because consultation was required before a decision could be made on your request. Following this extension, I am now in a position to respond.

An Epidemic Preparedness Notice came into force on 25 March 2020 in response to the initial outbreak of COVID-19. This Notice must be renewed every three months and is based on whether the Prime Minister is satisfied that the effects of the outbreak of COVID-19 are likely to significantly disrupt, or continue to significantly disrupt, essential government and business activity in New Zealand. As such, the Epidemic Preparedness Notice has been renewed every three months with the most recent renewal on 17 March 2022. You can find more information on the relevant Epidemic Preparedness Notice at: https://www.health.govt.nz/covid-19-novel-coronavirus/covid-19-response-planning/covid-19-epidemic-notice-and-orders#epidemic

Additionally, New Zealand's COVID-19 domestic outbreak is currently tracking behind most other countries. While it may be more appropriate in light of their domestic situations for other countries to ease restrictions faster than New Zealand, New Zealand needs to review its settings in light of its own domestic situation. This is to balance the impact of public health restrictions on New Zealanders and their communities against the need to minimise the spread of COVID-19 given the health, economic and social impacts of widespread community transmission.

As you are aware, the government assessed alternative strategies to help New Zealand transition from an elimination strategy, and the COVID-19 Protection Framework signalled our next step in managing COVID-19. Information related to the development of the Framework, set out in the table below, has been proactively released on the Unite Against COVID-19 website:

Purpose

1. This briefing seeks to clarify how vaccination requirements should apply to secondary students accessing workplace-based learning in light of the removal of some vaccine-mandate requirements from the COVID-19 Protection Framework; to extend medical grade face masking requirements for vaccine-mandate workers so that they apply at Orange as well as Red; and to confirm that delivery drivers should not be required to wear masks at Orange.

Recommendations

We recommend you:

- 1. **note** that the Ministry of Education considers that a secondary school student involved in a specific workplace-based element as part of a programme of learning (e.g. work experience) should be required to meet workplace vaccination policies, whether these policies are imposed by Government or by the business or tertiary education provider themselves (following a workplace health and safety risk assessment);
- note that based on current drafting in the COVID-19 Public Health Response (Protection Framework) Order 2021, a tertiary education provider or business offering workplacebased learning for secondary students as part of a programme of learning would only be able to deny the secondary student access if the vaccination requirement is Governmentmandated;
- 3. **note** that while is it anticipated that there will only be limited circumstances where continuation of an employer vaccination requirement would be justifiable, tertiary providers and businesses may still have specific roles or areas on-site where such requirements are still needed, based on a workplace health and safety risk assessment;
- 4. agree that where a tertiary provider or business requires a worker to be vaccinated for a specific role (based on an up-to-date workplace health and safety risk assessment), they may deny access to that workplace for unvaccinated secondary school students involved in work experience as part of a programme of learning;

Clarification of ability to deny access to workplace-based learning for secondary students based on vaccination status

Background

- 1. The rules in the COVID-19 Public Health Response (Protection Framework) Order 2021 (the Order) relating to vaccinations for secondary-tertiary students undertaking workplace-based learning (e.g. work experience) are framed around government mandated vaccination requirements under the COVID-19 Public Health Response (Vaccinations) Order 2021. This means that a tertiary education provider offering workplace-based learning for secondary students as part of their programme of learning can currently deny the secondary student access based on vaccination status <u>only</u> if the vaccination requirement is Government-mandated.
- 2. Since the amendment on 4 April 2022, the Government-imposed vaccine mandate has been limited to workers in health and disability, prisons and border and MIQ. Food and drink and close proximity workers are no longer vaccine-mandated workers. Tertiary education providers and businesses cannot currently deny access to secondary students if they choose to impose their own vaccination requirement for that specific role or workplace (e.g. to work in a café or hair salon). The Ministry of Education considers that this is inconsistent with the general education policy position related to vaccination status affecting access to learning.

Overview of education policy position

- 3. Government policy is that, in general, secondary students are entitled to access their programme of learning regardless of vaccination status. This means secondary school students should generally not be denied access to a tertiary education facility or business premises, based on their vaccination status. The Ministry of Education's policy position is that workplace-based learning such as work experience in a café or hair salon is the notable exception if that workplace is subject to a vaccination requirement. This means that secondary school students may be denied access to a tertiary facility or a business if that student is involved in workplace-based tertiary learning and that workplace is subject to a vaccination requirement (either imposed by government e.g. the health and disabilities workforce or by the tertiary provider or business e.g. in a café or hair salon).
- 4. This ability to deny access is intended to apply to any work experience undertaken by secondary students. This includes both where the workplace-based element occurs onsite at a tertiary provider or at a business (not onsite at a tertiary provider). This ensures consistency with public health advice around the level of risk for workplaces where a vaccination requirement exists, based on a government mandate or a business' workplace health and safety risk assessment.
- 5. This policy position means that some secondary-tertiary students need to be vaccinated (or hold a vaccine exemption as defined in the Vaccinations Order) to participate in certain work-experience programmes. This covers a sub-set of work-based secondary-tertiary programmes, such as those in health and disability services. The requirement for tertiary providers and businesses in general not to deny entry on vaccination grounds would stand for:
 - classroom-based learning onsite at tertiary premises; and
 - work-based secondary-tertiary programmes that are not covered by vaccination requirements (both onsite and offsite of tertiary premises).

With respect to the vaccine exemption, we expect this would largely relate to temporary medical exemptions, for example if the secondary student has recently recovered from COVID-19 illness.

Proposal to amend Order

- 6. Government vaccination requirements for the tertiary education sector and most businesses were removed at 11:59pm 4 April. The Government-imposed vaccine mandate is now limited to workers in health and disability, prisons and border and MIQ. Based on the updated guidance by Employment New Zealand and WorkSafe, we expect there will be limited circumstances where a voluntary continuation of an employer vaccination requirement would be justifiable. Nonetheless, tertiary education providers and businesses may implement such requirements (possibly for specific work-experience roles or areas onsite) where they continue to be supported by an updated workplace health and safety risk assessment.
- 7. We propose that amendments be made to the Order to ensure that where a tertiary provider or business requires a worker to be vaccinated for a specific role (based on an up-to-date workplace health and safety risk assessment, for example in a café or hair salon with many elderly or vulnerable clients), they may deny access for unvaccinated secondary school students involved in work experience as part of a programme of learning.
- 8. The Ministry of Education will provide relevant guidance to providers.

Masking requirements for "vaccine mandate" workers

- 9. Following changes to face mask requirements in January 2022, the COVID-19 Public Health Response (Protection Framework) Order 2021 (the Order) currently requires workers carrying out "vaccine-mandate" work to wear medical grade face-coverings at Red. The medical grade face covering rule only applies when working with members of the public, customers or clients or on the parts of premises that are open to the public. When these changes to face covering requirements at Red were agreed, they were not carried over to lower levels. This means the Order does not specify any face mask requirements for these vaccine-mandate workers at Orange.
- 10. On 21 March 2022, as part of New Zealand's 'post peak' changes, Cabinet agreed to retain requirements for the use of face masks indoors; retain workforce vaccine mandates for health and disability sector workers (which includes aged care workers), prison staff, and border and MIQ workers only; and to carry over the requirement at Red for specified public-facing workers to wear medical grade masks to Orange.¹ On the basis of this decision, drafting instructions did not include a requirement for vaccine-mandate workers to wear a medical grade mask at Orange, as no such masking requirements for these workers previously existed at Orange².

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Note that the Order imposing a vaccine mandate on Police and Defence personnel was set aside by the *Yardley* decision, consequently releasing those workers from the associated medical face mask requirement. Police and Defence have confirmed they are comfortable managing face mask requirements within their own policy settings rather than by way of legal requirement in the Order.

² However, drafting instructions did include specific provision to ensure that medical grade masks be required for public-facing workers at food and drink, close-proximity and events at Orange, as a requirement for these workers to wear a mask at Orange already existed. Note that these workers are no longer considered vaccine mandate workers.

FIN-CONFIDENCE

- 11. Customs has raised concerns that the lack of masking requirements at Orange increases the chances of border workers, who are generally considered to be at higher risk than others in the community, being exposed to new variants, becoming infected, and transmitting the virus on to others. This risk is also the basis for the continuation of vaccination mandates for these workers. Customs believes that the higher risk of exposure should be reflected consistently across the COVID-19 orders. It also appears inconsistent with the fact that food and drink, events, and close proximity workers are required to wear medical grade masks at Orange on the basis that these are higher risk settings. Having a legal requirement in place for these workers would also reduce the potential for inconsistency in settings with multiple PCBUs.
- 12. However, introducing a legal requirement for vaccine-mandate workers to wear medical grade face coverings at Orange may risk creating perceptions of 'inconsistency' within some border settings for example, workers at duty free shops, while still required to wear masks, are not subject to the higher "medical-grade" standard. It should also be considered that in some instances, operational policy may be sufficient to manage masking requirements.
- 13. Public health advice is that the medical grade masking requirement for these workers should apply at both Red and Orange. No such requirement is recommended at Green, given there are no legal masking requirements for any person. On balance, officials therefore recommend that the Order is amended to reflect this advice. Guidance is not considered sufficient, as this would not address the consistency and coherency concerns outlined in paragraph 11 which are currently considered more significant than those reflected in paragraph 12. It is recommended that this is given effect to via applying the same provision to all vaccine-mandate workers at Orange as at Red.

Delivery Drivers

- 14. Delivery drivers are currently required to wear face masks when undertaking close proximity deliveries indoors at Red (i.e. signature-required deliveries). No decision has been made regarding the position for close proximity deliveries at Orange.
- 15. Public health has confirmed that face coverings should not be required for delivery drivers at Orange, and also recommend that the requirement for delivery drivers to wear face masks at Red be reconsidered (note that this decision was made before masking requirements in outdoor settings were revoked). Public health notes that the contact is these situations is very brief and often outdoors. Drivers can still be encouraged to wear masks when delivering to the door. The requirement at Red creates a misalignment within the Order, whereby more stringent requirements are placed on delivery drivers who do not enter a person's home than on those providing in-home services, which are a group of persons not required to wear a face mask. The fact face coverings are now not required in outdoor settings creates further complexity for practical application of this rule.
- 16. Officials recommend that the Order be amended to remove the requirement for delivery drivers to wear face coverings at Orange, and that consideration also be given to removing this requirement at Red.

Next steps

23. Officials will instruct the Parliamentary Counsel Office to draft amendments to the COVID-19 Public Health Response (Protection Framework) Order 2021 to give effect to your decisions related to the matters above. Ideally, these would come into force before any part of New Zealand shifts to Orange. Guidance material and communications will be updated accordingly.

Consultation

- 24. The Ministry of Education provided content for this briefing related to the ability to deny access to secondary students for workplace-based learning based on vaccination status.
- 25. Customs, Ministry of Transport (MoT), Ministry of Business, Innovation, and Employment, Ministry for Primary Industries, Maritime, and Corrections were consulted on the proposal to extend the Red face-covering requirements for vaccine mandate workers to Orange. Ministry of Health provided public health advice. Agencies are supportive of the proposal, except for MoT, who prefers the status quo. MoT considers that legislating the requirement may not be necessary, and that operational policy could likely be sufficient to 'require' the use of medical grade masks in many instances. Relying on operational policy is consistent with these workers otherwise being exempt from the Order (except for the masking requirement at Red), and clearly enables PCBUs to make decisions that take into account their individualised operating contexts and health and safety risks. MoT also considers that introducing a legal requirement for these workers to wear medical grade face coverings at Orange may also risk increasing perceptions of 'inconsistency' within some border settings from the sector and the public's perspective for example, workers at duty free shops would not be subject to such a requirement.
- 26. Ministry of Health provided public health advice on the masking requirement for delivery drivers.

This request was made to my colleague, the Hon Chris Hipkins, as former Minister for COVID-19 Response. Following my appointment as Minister on 13 June 2022, I amnow responding.

I can advise that the majority of the documents you have requested **(bolded above)** will soon be proactively released on the 'Unite Against COVID-19 website, which is accessible via the following link: https://covid19.govt.nz/about-our-covid-19-response/proactive-releases

I am therefore refusing your request for these documents under section 18(d) of the Act, as the information requested is, or will soon be publicly available.

The briefing *Initial advice on transit passengers not completing their journey* dated 21 January 2022 will not be proactively released as it was not received or seen by Minister Hipkins.

This briefing title was published in error and has now been removed from the Unite Against COVID-19 website. The contents of this briefing were, however, sent to Minister Hipkins' office in an email and a summary of that email is being released to you as Appendix One.

Some information has been withheld from the summary under section 9(2)(h) of the Act, to maintain legal professional privilege. It is important to note that at the time, there was a legal requirement to have a valid MIQ voucher on arrival in New Zealand. Failing to comply with this legal requirement could have resulted in a \$1,000 fine, or a fine of up to \$4,000 if it is imposed by the Court. The penalties are set out here: https://www.legislation.govt.nz/regulation/public/2021/0393/latest/LMS600713.html

Anyone arriving without an MIQ voucher was referred to the New Zealand Police.

In making my decision on your request, I have taken the public interest considerations in section 9(1) of the Act into account.

You have the right to ask the Ombudsman to investigate and review my decision under section 28(3) of the Act.

Initial Advice on transit passengers not completing their journey – dated 21 January 2022

Background

- On 12 December 2021, a family (two adults, and two children) arrived in New Zealand from Sydney with the stated intention of transiting on to Fiji, but decided they no longer wished to continue with their transit flight. As they were New Zealand citizens, the Immigration Border Officer could not deny them entry or force them to leave on their Fiji flight and the family were transferred to MIQ at Novotel Airport.
- On 19, January the New Zealand Herald released an article outlining how this family were able to arrive in New Zealand without an MIQ voucher.
- We understand there is now another couple (both New Zealand Citizens) who arrived in New Zealand from Mexico, with the stated intention of taking a connecting flight on to Australia, who have also decided not to continue their connecting flight.

Current consequences for travellers who arrive in New Zealand with an MIQ voucher

- Travellers who refuse to transit can be liable for:
 - A fee/fine under the COVID-19 Public Health Response (Air Border Order)
 2020 either a \$1,000 fine of up to \$4,000, imposed by the court (cases are referred to the Police for enforcement action
 - MIQ charges under the COVID*19 Public Health Response (Managed Isolation and Quarantine Charges) Regulations 2020 (Unless they left prior to August 2020 and are intending to stay for at least 180 days OR they have the fees waived based on undue financial hardship
- Given the difficulty in securing an MIQ allocation, the current infringement offences
 may not be a significant deterrent to stop some travellers seeking to enter New
 Zealand by refusing to board a transit flight.
- However, there is an outstanding question as to whether there is likely to be an
 increase in New Zealand citizens failing to take a connecting flight and terminating
 their travel in New Zealand without an MIQ voucher, now that this has been
 publicised, and what the size and scale of the issue may be.

Options for deterring future non-compliance

- Officials have considered several options to deter non-compliance, should Ministers consider that further action was required
- Withheld under 9(2)(h)]
- these include
 - 1. **Increased communications** on the requirements for travellers:
 - This could include more detailed proactive communications on the requirements for travellers and could also help to highlight relevant penalties to help deter future non-compliance
 - Note that transit passengers are exempt from the requirements of clause 8 of the ABO (including the requirement to have a MIQ allocation) unless they are granted permission to enter New Zealand in accordance with the Immigration Act. A transit passenger is currently defined in terms of the Immigration Act which refers to a person who does not intend to enter New Zealand. Any risk

from this definition could be removed by bringing into force the definition of the transit passenger in the new ABO (which will commence on 27 February)

Next Steps

DPMC will provide further context next week, along with any further advice on tradeoffs and costs.

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
