

# Shorter stays in emergency departments

# TARGET DELIVERY ACTIONS

The Government is committed to providing timely, high-quality healthcare for all New Zealanders. Improved quarterly results and improved results compared with the same quarter in the prior year.

Patient demand is increasing. In the quarter ending December 31, 2024, there were 12,000 more patients presenting to emergency departments compared with the same quarter in the prior year. Despite the increased demand, 16,000 more patients were admitted, discharged or transferred in under six hours compared with the same quarter in the prior year. Preliminary results for the next quarter indicate further improvement in performance against this Target.

**The Minister of Health** is focused on driving action to ensure that all New Zealanders have access to timely high-quality healthcare. Improvements across the whole system of care are needed to reduce the unacceptable wait times at emergency departments.

# The Minister of Health has announced priorities for making immediate improvements to the delivery of public health services. This includes the following actions:

- Stabilise Health NZ's governance and accountability arrangements to allow the organisation to get back to basics on delivering for New Zealanders.
- Enable primary care to treat more patients in the community by investing in core general
  practice services to provide faster and more flexible access, offering digital access to 24/7
  primary care, increasing and retaining doctors in primary care, and increasing primary
  care nurses. This includes recently announced \$164m funding boost for urgent and
  after care healthcare.
- Investing in new and extended urgent care services to ensure people can get the right care, at the right time while reducing pressure on emergency departments. Restored access to urgent care on weekends in Tairāwhiti with the launch of a new service
- Expanded the adult emergency department to increase capacity at Auckland City Hospital, one of the busiest in the country, seeing around 80,000 adult patients per year.

## HOW TO FIND OUT MORE

Health agencies will report on progress each quarter. National and regional results will be published so New Zealanders will be able to see how their local hospital is performing.
