

TARGET DELIVERY ACTIONS

The Government is focused on restoring law and order, to ensure all New Zealanders feel safe in their communities.

The Target continues to be met. The New Zealand Crime and Victims' Survey (NZCVS) results for this quarter show ~29,000 fewer adults experienced violent crime than at the baseline (Oct 2023).

The NZCVS asks respondents of their experience of reported and unreported crime over the past 12 months. While NZCVS produces reliable and robust trends, quarterly data is potentially more volatile and may fluctuate.

The Government's focus will remain on continuing to reduce the number of victims of violent crime by:

- Increasing the chance of violent offenders being caught and held to account. The
 Government is focused on providing the Police and courts with the extra tools they need
 to tackle serious crime, including through the Three Strikes, Sentencing Reform, and
 Gang Harm legislation. Work is also underway to get the Stalking and Harassment and
 Responding to Serious Youth Offending bills enacted. Gang Disruption Units are in place
 and delivering (with 550 insignia charges laid). An additional 78 beds at Rimutaka Prison
 are available for use.
- Targeting resources to where they are needed. Around 380 more family violence
 victims are eligible for safety programmes in the criminal court each month in Auckland.
 A third intensive Serious Youth Offender case management response team has been
 established in Christchurch.
- Breaking the cycle of violence. Expanded alcohol and drug interventions for remand population are on track at three additional prison sites, and 96 dedicated mental health and addiction beds at the new Waikeria Corrections facility is on track.
